Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Each side head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section on alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years and cultivation of the land; also 90 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 90 acres and erect house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation on notes, on certain conditions.

Good Candy a Human Benefactor

A recent issue of "The Canada Lancel" contains a leading article entitled, "Candy as a Food," which entirely dissipates the theory still prevalent in some quarters, that candy is an unwholesome luxury, which should be very charily indulged in. The "Lancel" brings an abundance of scientific data to the support of the contention that sugar is a necessary food. It is especially suitable for children who do not as a rule care for fat meat, but who take readily to sweets, which serve as a natural substitute for fat. Candy constitutes a food of the carbohydrate class and it is estimated that the average active and healthy adult requires daily for his effective sustenance about 6,000 grams of carbohydrates. The popular ingredient, chocolate, is also a most nourishing fat food and stimulant; while it appears that the flavonings of good candy are an aid to digestion and elimination.

The notion that the eating of candy injures the teeth is dismissed by this scientific journal as a superstition. The lack of sugar is much more likely to injure the teeth, through poor nutrition, and is attendant with more serious consequences than even those caused by the derangement of the digestive apparatus by over-indulgence in candy or any other food. On the whole, candy, when safeguarded against vicious adulterations, is a boon to the human race because it affords necessary heat-producing nourishment in a most palatable form. It might be added that it is an excellent aid to temperance; for it is an effective antidote to the craving for alcohol.

It would appear, therefore, that the widely prevailing human taste for candy, especially in growing children, is soundly based on Nature's needs. The man who takes home a box of candy to his wife; or the youth who finds it a way to the good-will of his sweetheart, is thereby doing a good deed, is providing her with beneficial carbohydrates, though for our part, we prefer the old-fashioned name of "sweets."



REPARATION DEMANDED FOR STOLEN ART

PARIS, Mar. 4.—As reparation for the works of art destroyed in France by the Germans it is suggested by the French Academy of fine arts, according to the Journal des Debats, that works of French genius now in the collections of the former royal families and public museums of Germany and Austria be put at the disposal of the French state which will select some of these works as a legitimate indemnity. The signers of the petition demand that the following principle be written in the peace treaty:—that the diminution brought to the art treasures of the attacked nations be compensated for by the handing over of the works of art in the countries which have carried out the destructions.
