**HOSPITAL CANTEENS GET TOBACCO NOW FREE OF DUTY**

OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—"Smokes" free from excise duty in the canteens of the military convalescent hospitals and clearing depots has caused general jubilation among the wounded men returned to Canada for treatment. The news that the Governor General, in Council, had ordered that the hospital canteens be granted the same privileges enjoyed by the canteens in camps and be allowed to sell tobacco and cigarettes free from excise duty has made the convalescent men see double. Their income is automatically increased and life looks twice as bright.

**Long Agitated**  
 The question of duty free tobacco in the hospital canteens has been a long mooted question among the men. They could not see why they who had been overseas and done their part in the fight should not have the privileges as those extended to the men who had not seen overseas service. Considerable friction has arisen on the subject. The complaints registered with the officers in charge of the institutions were sent to Military Hospitals Commission headquarters.

The matter was taken up and upon the joint recommendation of the President of the Commission, the Minister of Inland Revenue and the Minister of Militia and Defence His Excellency, the Governor General issued the order.

The effect of the order is not a saving for the men particularly, but the elasticity it adds to their allowance is a great boon. Nicotine is not listed among medicinal drugs, but to the wounded man it is the universal "pain killer."

**THICK WEATHER HELPED ENEMY IN DOVEI RAID**

DOVER, Feb. 19.—The weather was thick and the night was very dark when the German destroyers dashed upon British patrol vessels in the Strait of Dover early Friday morning and sank eight of them. The patrol vessels being equipped only with light armament for anti-submarine work, did not have a chance once the Germans got among them.

The risk thus taken is shared by great numbers of trawlers and drifters, operating in all weather and at all hours. Yet the proportion of losses has been remarkably small.

On the latest occasion the crews bore themselves with the same coolness and courage that drifter men have shown in innumerable circumstances of danger and difficulty. In one noteworthy incident, a drifter was shelled at close quarters by two German destroyers, whose thirty-pound shells killed all of the crew except two and set the drifter afire. The survivors, seeing their craft ablaze and believing it would sink, launched a boat. They had not rowed far when they saw the vessel set still ahead and the enemy retreating. They returned, put out the fire, and brought the drifter to port.

**FORMER M. P. JAILED FOR CIRCULATION OF PACIFIST LEAFLETS**

LONDON, Feb. 19.—Arnold Lepton, noted civil and mining engineer and former member of Parliament, was sentenced today in Bow Street court to six months imprisonment for circulating a pacifist leaflet. The printer of the leaflet was fined £90.

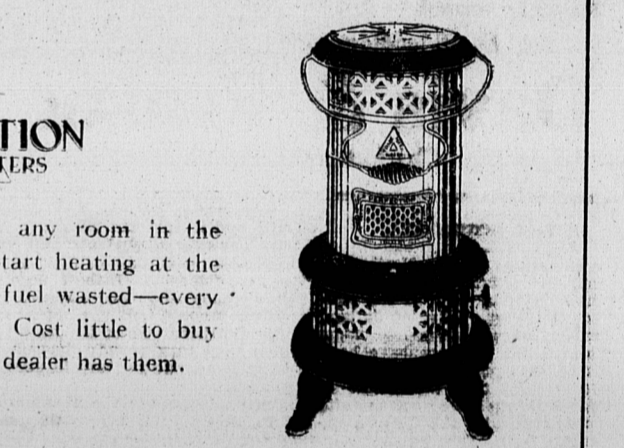

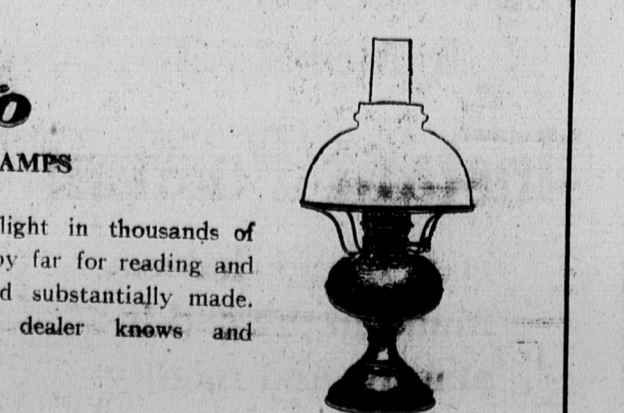

**BREAD RATIONING SOON FOR GREAT BRITAIN.**

LONDON, Feb. 19.—The cereal situation is beginning to cause some anxiety, and it may ultimately become necessary to institute bread rations, although Chancellor Bonar Law, said in the house of commons on Wednesday that at the end of last year the total stocks of wheat in this country were greater by 2,000,000 quarters than they were at the end of 1916, it must be remembered that Great Britain is taking a generous share in helping to stave off starvation in France and Italy. The supplies of meats are somewhat better at this week-end. Most of the butchers and retailers obtained fairly good amounts at the Smithfield market this morning.
