SCHOONER TOTAL LOSS—The schooner Grace Darling, Captain Saunders, from Halifax for Georgetown, P. E. I., to load produce, ran ashore in a storm Monday December 5, on Palmer Island, at the entrance to Georgetown Harbor. The schooner is now a total loss, with the Captain standing by to salvage what can be saved from the wreck. The vessel ran into bad weather practically from the time she left Halifax, and on Thursday, December 1, in a strong breeze, the forecast was carried away. A sail was rigged to continue the voyage, and in trying to make the harbor in rough weather she struck on Palmer Island. The crew took to the boats and came ashore, saving their effects before leaving the vessel. They then had to walk several miles before finding a house to make their plight known. The crew reached Halifax on Sunday morning from the Island in charge of Joseph Huddy, the mate. Captain Saunders will remain on the Island until all that can be saved from the vessel is brought ashore. The Grace Darling was built at Mahons Bay in 1906 and was registered in Lunenburg. She was 66.6 feet long, beam of 20.6 feet, and 8 feet deep, with a registered tonnage of 64. F. W. Carline, of Halifax, is the managing owner.—Halifax Chronicle.

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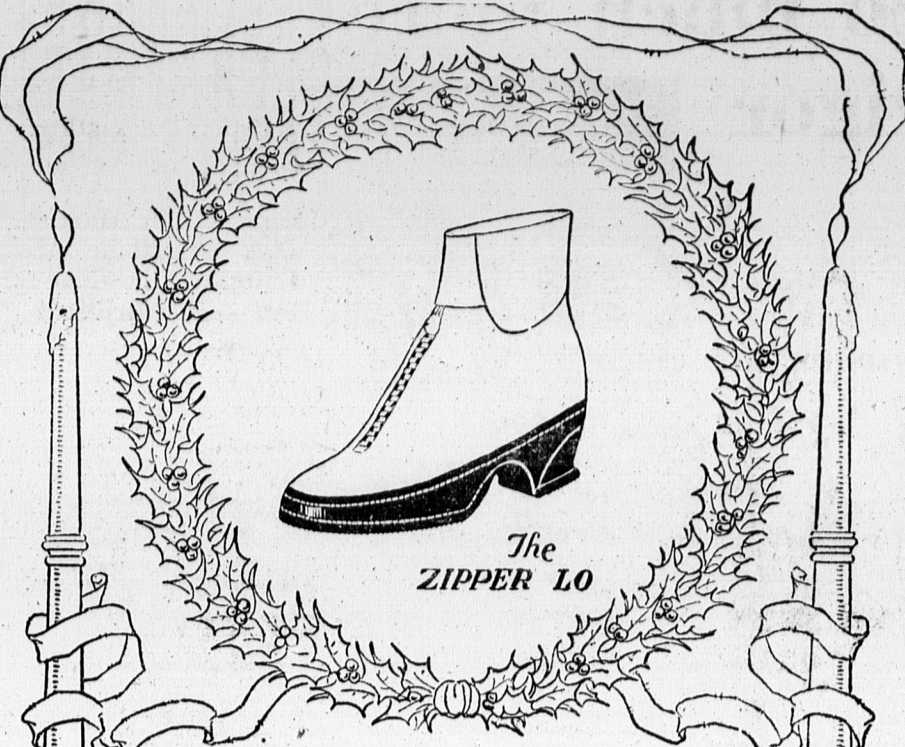

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Dec. 14.—There were 14 cattle; 17 calves; 409 hogs and 11 sheep and lambs offered for sale on the two markets this morning. There were no good cattle and hogs were selling for \$3.00 with cutters \$3.50 and \$3.75. Common suckers brought \$11.00 and good ones were quoted up to \$13.50. Common lambs were \$10.50 to a shade better, and hogs were unchanged. The bulk were delivered on contract and the few fresh sales were at the same figure, \$9.00 was the ruling price on good quality hogs weighing from 150 to 230 pounds. Some poor quality and lighter hogs were sold for a little less money. Sows were quoted \$7.50 to \$8.00.
