THE GENERALS.

It has been announced that General Sir Redvers Buller will have the chief command of the British forces in South Africa, and that General Sir George Stewart White, will, under General Buller, have command of the forces in Natal.

Sir Redvers Buller was born sixty years ago and has seen active service in eight campaigns in Asia and Africa. In six of these he received honorable mention. He received the Victoria Cross for personal heroism during the Zulu war, when he rescued two officers and a private, who but for his assistance would have been slain. He fought with distinction in the Ashantee war of 1873-4, the Boer war of 1881, the Egyptian war of 1882, the Sudan expedition of Sir Gerald Graham in 1884 and the Sudan expedition of the following year under Sir Garnet, now Lord Wolseley.

In the second Sudan campaign he was General Wolseley's chief of staff, and later took command of the Desert Column, extricating it from its perilous position at Gubat and winning the battle of Abou Klea. Sir Redvers was also once commander of the forces in Ireland. His experience in the Boer war of 1881, his knowledge of the country and of the enemy he will have to meet, and above all his military skill and resolute fighting qualities, were no doubt the factors which led to General Buller being selected for command in South Africa at the present time.

General Sir George Stewart White who will have command of the smaller force operating from Natal, is sixty-five years old, and has seen such active service, chiefly in India. He served there during the great mutiny of 1857, in the Afghan war of 1878-80 and in various other Indian campaigns since He was commander-in-chief of the forces in India from 1893 to 1898. From these few facts it will be seen that in the event of war in South Africa the command of the British forces will be in capable and veteran hands.

The Chicago Tribune publishes a list of the donations to educational institutions in the Republic during the first nine months of the current year. They are headed with Mrs. Leland Stanford's splendid gift of \$15,000,000 to Stanford University, and make a grand aggregate of \$28,720,617. Twenty four of these donations range from \$100,000 each upward to the princely gift of Mrs. Stanford.

The contradictory reports as to Hon. Mr. Tarte's health since his return to Canada have been remarked upon. The Ottawa Free Press, which is no doubt well-informed as well as most friendly to the Minister of Public Works, says:

The state of Mr. Tarte's health is not too good. On leaving Paris he was

far from being completely restored. He is still convalescent, and will be compelled to take considerable rest. In fact, he lately wrote that he would be unable to do very much work and intimates that he cannot now take a hand in the organization of the party.

British Columbia is enjoying a very large railway expenditure in those days. The C. P. R. has expended over \$9,000,000 in the construction of the Cross Nest Railway from Fort McLeod to Kootenay Lake, two thirds of which is the direct outlay of the company and \$3,000,000 of Government subsidy. The Boundary Creek Railway is another expensive work now under construction, the main line and branches of which will cost \$4,500,000. This was sometimes spoken of as the Kettle River road, is being built without subsidy or other public aid. Railway building in a mountainous country like British Columbia is enormously expensive, but the natural resources of the Province are so great as to justify the cost and give promise of paying traffic.

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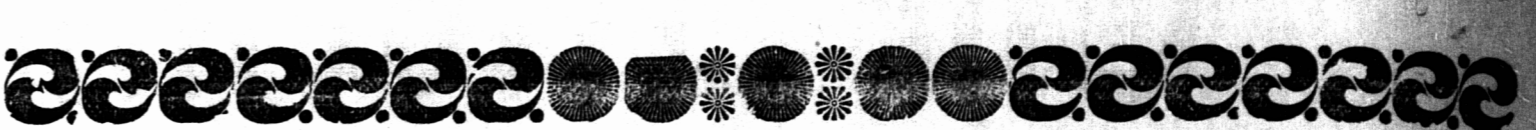

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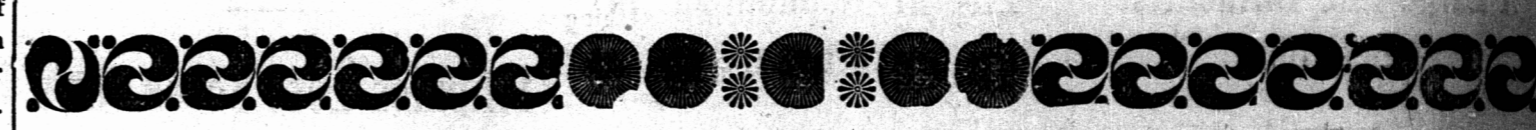
