Baldwin's Road Woman Fatally Burned At Home

Mrs. Harry Trainor, 45, died in the Montague Hospital yesterday morning as the result of burns received at her home, Baldwin's Road on Monday morning. In attempting to remove a frying pan filled with burning grease from the kitchen range, Mrs. Trainor was severely burned about the body, legs, face, and hands. Mr. Trainor was in the City at the time. A neighbor extinguished the fire about Mrs. Trainor's clothing and rushed her to the hospital. Five years ago while the late Mrs. Trainor and her husband were in church, fire took the lives of two of their children, Gladys, the eldest, and Jimmie, the baby. The house and all its contents were destroyed. In the recent tragedy, the home escaped damage.

Besides her husband, the late Mrs. Trainor is survived by six children, Ruth, Cecil, Anita, Helen, Marcella, and Rosena.

Steamer At Georgetown To Load Pit Props

The British freighter S.S. Amberstone arrived in Georgetown yesterday afternoon to load 1,800 cords of pit props for the Old Country. Loading operations will begin today and are expected to require from six to eight days. The pit props are piled in a yard at the west end of the Town and will be trucked to the waterfront. The steamer will take only a small part of the pit props here, owned by the Bergmann Construction Co.

Wallace MacDonald of Charlottetown is expected to have charge of the woodcuders. The S.S. Amberstone has a registered tonnage of 1,516 and is owned by the Crete Shipping Company, Ltd., London, England. This ship sailed for Georgetown from Hartlepool, England, and called at Sydney, N.S. to take on coal.

The ship arrived in Georgetown about 1 p.m. and was piloted in by Capt. Temple, God, assisted by his co-pilot, Victor Rafuse.
