—The party who broke into the Alberton station, a few months ago, has been discovered. Detective Noble, of the I. C. R., has been working on the case and on Tuesday arrested Leo McIntyre, a lad of about 15 years of age, whose home is in Alma. McIntyre made an open confession and says that Irving Lewis of Alberton was his accomplice. McIntyre has been taken to Summerside to stand trial and the arrest of Lewis is expected to follow. Following are later particulars received from The Guardian's Summerside representative:—T. A. Noble, police inspector of Canadian Government Railway, who has been in the western part of this Province for the past few days has succeeded in solving the mystery of the different acts of burglary, committed in the past few months at Alberton, Tignish, O'Leary, Elmsdale and Alma. On the 15th of June the station at Alberton was entered and the contents of the cash drawer removed. Sometime later the act was repeated, but there being no loose cash outside the safe, nothing was secured. Gaudet's store at Alberton was broken into, shortly after, and Arsenault's store at Tignish on July 29th. On the night of 11th August Maynard Lewis of Alberton was robbed of large sum of money. Leo McIntyre and Irving Lewis were suspected of the act. Next morning the two young men boarded the morning train at Elmsdale. Lewis was arrested and taken back to Alberton. Later he was liberated and left the country. McIntyre jumped the last moving train and fled to the woods, as reported in The Guardian, the following morning. Detective Noble arrested Leo McIntyre at Alberton and he was remanded for trial before Stipendiary Tweedy at Alberton on Wednesday next. McIntyre made and signed a confession acknowledging that he and Irving Lewis were the perpetrators of all the different acts of theft and burglary. He also stated that Lewis had threatened to shoot him if he at any time divulged anything that would implicate him. Lewis McIntyre was brought to Summerside by the evening train last night and placed in jail for safe keeping. Mr Noble deserves much credit for the manner in which he worked up this case in so short a time. He is close on the trail of Lewis and expects in a few days to have him rounded up also, although at the present time Lewis is not in the Province. McIntyre after his wild dash for liberty left the Province, but returned a few weeks ago. Detective Noble leaves for the mainland this morning.

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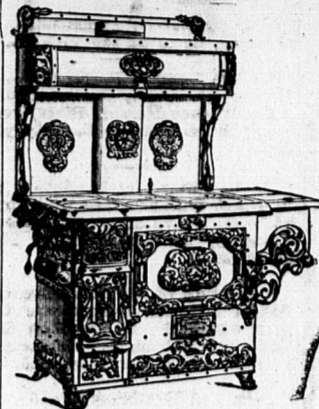
