The work of placing them in foster homes, and thus providing them with normal conditions, has been most encouraging and successful, he said.

BRITISH MARKET IMPROVES The current issue of the market report of the Dominion Live Stock Branch contains the following reference to conditions in the British market: Reports from the British market indicate improved trading. At Birkenhead, although the supply of Irish cattle was very liberal, there was a ready clearance under brisk trading, and while prices were not very much higher, being a little under 1-2 cent improved, there were indications of further strength. At Norwich store cattle market, the undertone was firm and dealers were asking higher prices. The continued poor return on the Pound Sterling is an almost insurmountable obstacle to exports of Canadian cattle at this time. Store cattle at Norwich sold during the week from \$39 to \$68 at current rate of exchange. The effect on prices of the poor return on the Pound Sterling is indicated in the fact that at par exchange these prices would, in Canadian funds, be \$12 to \$19 higher.

'OLIVES' LOST NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—Uncle Sam can become a wily old gentleman when occasion demands. Listen to how he verified his suspicions about several barrels of olives. The barrels arrived several months ago from Turkey, but no one appeared to claim them, and they lay in a government warehouse. Customs agents were suspicious but they couldn't legally break open the barrels to see what was inside. Then someone had a bright idea. An urgent plea was sent to the department of agriculture, which forthwith condemned the olives as "unfit for human consumption."

Freud Defends Scientific Status Of Psychoanalysis

VIENNA, Dec. 16. (A.P.)—Sigmund Freud, world famous psychologist, in a new book appearing in Vienna this week vigorously defends the scientific status of psychoanalysis.

He raps the knuckles of novelists and conversationalists who wisecrack about the study, and reveals he is of the opinion that the scientific world will soon be compelled to take mental telepathy and thought transference more seriously.

While warning his reader he is not yet ready to say that mental telepathy has been proved or that he himself is entirely convinced of its validity, Dr. Freud cites abundant material drawn from psychoanalysis which he says tends to substantiate theories of thought transference and telepathy.

The volume is entitled "A new series of introductory lectures on psychoanalysis."

In the 254 pages Freud discusses revision or the dream theory, dreams and the occult dissection of psychic personality, fear, femininity, applications of psychoanalysis and, in the final chapter, religious and intellectual nihilism and bolshevism. Dr. Freud analyzes the present economic crisis as the price the world is paying for the latest tremendous conquest over nature—namely, aviation.

The Great War became possible, the psychologist explained, when Bleriot flew over the English Channel, and became inevitable when Germany developed a zeppelin capable of flying over Britain.

Dr. Freud said, in the interview, that he views the Soviet regime as a giganticly daring attempt to remake the social order. He added however, that he fears the future may show that this attempt was made too soon.

There's A Reason For Everything

YARMOUTH, N. S., Dec. 15.—(C.P.)—Three discoveries were made today. The first was a buoy picked up by a couple of lobster fishermen about two miles from land. At the end of a line attached thereto was a full quart bottle.

The second was a lobster boat, sighted some two miles off-shore by the Provincetown schooner Mary P. Goulart, Captain Lawrence Santos. A cursory examination showed no sign of life on board, and the Goulart towed the derelict into port here.

The third turned up when one of the Goulart's crew decided to investigate further. It consisted of two lobster fishermen, peacefully curled up asleep in the salvaged craft's cuddy.

Runs Temperature Of 110 Degrees And Is Living

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 15.—(A.P.)—A 20-year-old Mexican girl today amazed medical authorities of the Los Angeles General Hospital by running a temperature of 110 degrees. Medical men say 101 degrees is fatal.

For three months, doctors said today, Alice Tolan has been running an almost daily temperature of a height never before equalled by a human sufferer.

Dr. P. Berman, medical director of the General Hospital, brain, lung and other specialists who examined Miss Tolan have concluded that a tubercular tumor in the third ventricle of the brain where the "heat centre" of the human is located, has prevented control of her bodily temperature.

Dr. Berman said there was no way in which an operation could be performed to remove the tumor and restore the heat controlling functions.

Il Duce Hints At Reprisals

ROME, Dec. 15.—Commercial reprisals for acts of anti-Italian vandalism in Trau and other Jugoslavian cities, were intimated today by Premier Benito Mussolini in a reply in the Senate to an interpellation presented by a number of leading Senators.

"Jugoslavia had better not forget that her commercial relations with Italy constitute the most important point of her exports," the Premier said.

He added that the "vandalism" provoked the "resentment of every civilized country in the world, and that this was not an isolated instance but a continuous program showing open hostility to Italy and operated on a precise and inspired plan.

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 15.—Mr. R. A. Tury of Toronto, an official of the Sun Life Assurance Co. of that city and brother of the late Lieutenant Governor Tury of Nova Scotia was a passenger on the Maritime Express of the Canadian National Railways this morning enroute to Halifax where he was killed on account of the serious illness of his brother there.

Speaking with regard to conditions in Ontario he stated that the gold production has played a great part in the excellent way in which the province has weathered the period of financial stress.

The Province of Ontario he said of all the provinces of Canada, would seem to be the best off. When he left New York Mr. Tury remarked the bankers seemed to have been under the impression that payment would not be demanded on this date of the instalments due today.
