Gaudet, but when the ballot was taken it showed that the arguments of Ignorance had won the question with a small majority.

WORE MASK WHILE AT ILLEGAL WORK

Miss Griffiths Tells of Prisoners Part in the Death of Susan Geary and Efforts to Save Her.

Boston, Nov. 28.—At today's session of the trial of Dr. Percy D. McLeod, charged with being an accessory to the death of Susanna Agnes Geary, the victim of the "dress suit case mystery," Louis W. Crawford and William E. Hunt testified that Dr. McLeod said he would prepare the body of the girl for disposal, and that he delivered the suit case to them after they had been made ready.

Sarah E. Griffiths, a nurse, testified to being called to the house and asked to assist at the laparotomy operation which Dr. McLeod said was the only thing that would save Miss Geary's life. She agreed to assist.

The operation was skillfully performed, she testified, and no effort was lacking to save the girl. After Miss Geary had come out of the ether the nurse thought that the operation was successful. There was no change for the worse until the following Sunday night. Dr. McLeod by telephone instructed her and she followed his instructions. About daylight the following morning she noticed a change for the worse in the girl's condition, and telephoned Dr. McLeod, who came to the house at once.

Dr. McLeod administered hypodermic injections. The girl lived throughout the day and until 1.45 o'clock Tuesday morning. Only the nurse and Miss Sarah Dean were with her when she died. She died peacefully the nurse testified, and was conscious to the last. She made no request for a priest or that her parents be sent for. Miss Griffiths said she tried to induce the girl to tell her the name of her mother, and the latter's address but the girl refused to do so, saying her mother knew nothing of her condition and she didn't want her to know. She said she was a saleslady and that she came from Lowell.

Emma W. Colter, of Jamaica Plains, who had been employed as a maid at the house occupied by Mrs. Dean at 68 Winthrop street, Roxbury, identified Dr. McLeod as a man she saw there on two or more occasions. She had seen him in the room occupied by Miss Geary at which time he wore a mask.

Two witnesses testified that before the laparotomy operation was performed Dr. McLeod and Dr. John H. Pettes wore white masks which they removed after the Geary girl became unconscious.
