**THE AVERAGE BRITISHER.**

"An Average Britisher," as he subscribes himself, writes to the Ottawa Free Press to resent the current statements about ignorance of Canada being prevalent in Britain. He affirms that the average British boy knows more about Canada than the average Canadian boy knows about Great Britain; that if Canadians are called Americans when they arrive in England it is because the Canadian tries to appear like the Yankee; that as to the Englishman being rare who has a knowledge of the geography of Canada, the Canadian who knows the geography of the British Isles is a scarcer article, and moreover that "the average Britisher is smarter than the average Canadian."

We take it that the sentence just quoted is a distinct challenge to our Canadian self-conceit. Whether or no we ought to resent it is a matter for consideration. Is the average Britisher smarter, that is, quicker in thought or action, more bright, acute intelligent, clever, than the average Canadian? If we accept the Britisher's challenge, how far can we make good our position? These are matters worth thinking over.

The people of the British Isles have accomplished great things. Great things in colonization, in conquest, in commerce, in literature. To achieve the supremacy of the sea; to own the greatest navy that ever was; to hold half the commerce of the world under their flag; to rule more than three hundred millions of other races in India and Africa; to have spread the English language and free institutions to the ends of the earth—these are surely great achievements for a people dwelling in two small islands of the northern sea.

Where are our Canadian Shakespeares,

Miltons, Tennysons, Besses, Moores, Bacons, Newtons, Nelsons, Wellingtons, Marlboroughs; our Macaulays, Carlyles, our Pitts, Cannings, Gladstones! They are yet to be. After all the Britisher in the light of history seems to have been a pretty smart man. It may be wholesome for the average Canadian who feels disposed to sneer at the average Britisher, to pause for awhile and consider the extent of what Britishers have accomplished, and the comparative limitations of Canadian achievement.

Lord Dundonald seems to have had a good time in Toronto. Thousands cheered him to the echo when he spoke and on the street the enthusiastic people drew his carriage along. It is given out that he will remain in Canada and may enter politics. This may serve to enliven our next great political campaign. It will be something new and rare to have a live lord and general directing the political tactics and strategy of Canadian affairs.

The Dukhobors have started on another pilgrimage, wearing no garments but a spirit of enthusiasm, and the St. John Sun says, "Don't stop them." The Sun's notion is to have them move right on out of the country: "These gentle innocents are unsuited to our institutions and climate. Nearer the equator they may find a home where they can go on pilgrimages every day, where neither custom nor climate require men and women to be clothed, and where vegetable food of some sort is growing all the year round."

Wireless telegraphy is being steadily extended. Ocean steamers now sometimes keep up communication with one or the other shore all the way across the Atlantic. The Canadian Government is establishing stations in the Gulf; the United States Government is instituting a system on the Atlantic coast from the eastern boundary of Maine down to Panama. The New York Globe says: "If it goes on as it has begun it will soon convert oceans into mere sounding boards and make distance formidable only to travellers."

A few days ago a singular man died in Toledo in the person of its Mayor Samuel F. Jones. He was commonly called "Golden Rule Jones," from the fact of his professed adoption of that rule in his life and business. He made a fortune from manufacturing an article which he invented and patented in connection with the oil business. Then he increased the pay of his work-people, shortened the day's work to eight hours and in addition shared his profits with them. On Sundays and in his campaigns he preached a sort of Christian socialism. He was four times elected Mayor of Toledo and died in office.
