REMOVING BUILDINGS - It was reported by Deputy Minister of Reconstruction, J. P. Connolly, that the work of moving seven teen buildings from the site of the local Airport was commenced yesterday morning. These buildings, which have been purchased by former residents at Maple Hills, are being moved to various locations, the majority of which will be on the outskirts of the City at St. Avaris, Mt. Edward Road and Belvedere Road. Mr. Connolly said that it would take about two days to move each building, which would mean about five weeks to complete the entire job. Employing about eight men, Mr. Horatio Campbell of Mount Pleasant is in charge of the moving operations.
