A PARTY of American tourists from Philadelphia, New York and Boston held a garden party on Tuesday, at the beautiful residence of Frederick C. H. Richards, Mount Mellick, after spending a very enjoyable afternoon they all unanimously expressed a very laudable opinion of the beauties of that section of the country as well as of the Garden of the Gulf and each hopes ere long to visit this fair Island once more.

YACHT RACE AT GEORGETOWN YESTERDAY.

A large crowd witnessed the yacht race, at Georgetown, yesterday, for the Hodgson Cup. Competition has become so close in recent years that great interest was taken in the races. Five boats entered: Mamie C., John McPhee, Annandale; Lina May, Harry McLean, Souris; Shamrock, John Condon, Panmore Island; Myrtle E., Samuel Hemphill, Georgetown; Petrel, Ephraim McKeenzie, Souris.

The judges of the race were Hon. A. J. McDonald, Judge Warburton, J. A. Mathieson and Wm. Jenkins; Starter F. J. Sullivan; Timers C. A. Aitken, J. D. Dewar; Treasurers, P. McLeod, D. H. McEachern, T. E. Morrissey.

The course was from McDonald Bros. wharf to Star buoy at the mouth of Sturgeon Bay, thence to Burat Point, back to Sturgeon Star buoy thence to stake anchored off ferry wharf and return. This course which was to be run over twice makes 28 miles.

The boats rounded the first buoy in the following order: 1st Mamie C., 2nd Lina May, 3rd Shamrock, 4th Petrel, 5th Myrtle E. When the second buoy was turned Myrtle E. had passed Petrel.

At 3.30 the race was finished, Shamrock winning with Lina May a close second and Mamie C. third. Good cash prizes were provided for boats winning 2nd, 3rd and 4th places. The cup must be won three successive years before it becomes keeps.

In connection with the races the boating club held a very successful tea on the beautiful grounds of Capt. Mal. McDonald overlooking the harbor. A large crowd of people patronised the table and saloons and a neat sum was realised.
