TRIAL POTATO SHIPMENTS—In order to take advantage of any future market that South America may afford for Island seed potatoes, the Potato Growers Association supplied seed of different varieties for exhibit at the British Empire Trade Exposition, Mr. S. G. Peppin, head of the Seed Potato Certification Service made the selection, and the Dominion Department arranged for the transportation. The Association during the last two or three years has been sending trial shipments of seed to South America and Cyprus with the hope that eventually it will be possible to interest these sections in Island seed. The reports received have been satisfactory, but there are so many handicaps in shipping to these markets that they would be practically useless excepting such seasons when potato values are very low.

MUST STAND TRIAL—An Amherst correspondent to the Halifax Herald says:—Charged with criminal neglect resulting in the death of the infant child of Helen Farrow in a barn in Amherst some 10 days ago, the mother and Jerome Wilson of Prince Edward Island were committed for trial Wednesday by Stipendiary McKenzie. Edna Auld, who accompanied the two from Charlottetown to Amherst and who was with them when the child died, is being detained as a material witness. The latter gave evidence at the preliminary hearing and declared that the three of them and the baby had come from Charlottetown to Moncton and then journeyed by rail to Brunswick, arriving here on Monday, April 13. No information was given as to why she was with the party. It is understood that the accused have elected to be tried by Judge Patterson in the county court and that the case will come up for hearing on Tuesday next.

PASTORAL CHANGES—Changes are taking place in the Baptist pastorates of the Island. Rev. M. O. Brinton, of Tryon, has resigned to accept a call to Campbellton, New Brunswick. He will be succeeded by Rev. R. S. Gregg, of Hillsboro, N. B. Before Mr. Brinton leaves the Island Province, a roll call will be held in the Tryon Church in conjunction with the District Conference, which meets at Tryon on May 6 and 7. Visitors from other provinces will be in attendance. Rev. A. Crowe, who recently succeeded Rev. Dr. Sides, a pastor of the Bedeque Baptist Church is proving himself a worthy successor to one whose place it is difficult to fill. Rev. E. J. Chisholm successor to Rev. R. W. Lindsay, at Hazelbrook is upholding the high standard, set before him by his predecessor, as preacher and pastor.

KANSAS MAY ENFORCE ITS OLD BLUE LAWS

TOPEKA, Kan., April 23. (U. P.)—Forces supporting reform and forces advocating modification of Kansas' blue laws today prepared for a legal battle, which may close permanently theatres in the state's larger cities.

According to state statutes, it is against the law for theatres to operate on Sunday. In the larger cities, however, such as Kansas City, Wichita and Hutchinson, the law is not enforced.

A recent movement has been launched by club women and ministerial alliances of the various cities for strict enforcement of the blue laws. The most important fight now is underway at Wichita, where plans have been made for filing of an ouster petition against the Fox West Coast Theaters Company unless it closes its shows in Kansas on Sunday.

An enthusiastic meeting of the Alexandra Society was held in St. Peter's Guild Room on Wednesday afternoon, the 22nd inst. The President, Mrs. George Hodgson, presided. The meeting was opened with prayer. Mrs. Hodgson then spoke a few words urging all the members to give their loyal support to King's College, the only Divinity College in the Maritime Provinces. The business of the meeting was then transacted. The Secretary Treasurer Mrs. W. C. Cooke, reported the sum of \$128.00 on hand from the collection of fees and calendars from St. Peter's and St. Paul's Churches and that there had been some new members added to our list. The following officers were then elected for the coming year:

The following telegram of encouragement was read from Dr. Moore. President of King's College: "Heartiest greetings to Charlottetown Alexandra Society. King's now preparing to close most successful session in new building. One hundred resident students of whom twenty-three are women and twenty-five studying for the sacred ministry. By practicing economy and continuous loyal support of friends we can now pay our way. Alexandra Society here provided much furniture for Women's residence. Received request last week of one thousand dollars for library. Hope your branch sends representative annual meeting here May 6th. Best thanks for loyal and generous support. King's College never more worth working for and prospects never brighter. (Signed) Arthur H. Moore, President."

A resolution was unanimously passed thanking Dr. Moore for his kind and encouraging words and for the splendid report of the work of the college, and the secretary was ordered to have the same entered upon the minutes of the society and a copy sent to Dr. Moore.

Canon Malone, who was present then gave a short but inspiring address. He said that in these days of organization of all kinds for collecting money that we would be told that the Alexandra Society was only one other for the same purpose. But we must remember that we were collecting for the work of the King of Kings. We were offering our money in the service of God; but that was not all, there was the rule of prayer, both should go together. He quoted the Psalmist's words "Unto Him shall be given of the gold of Arabia, prayer shall be made ever unto Him and daily shall He be praised."

One of the earliest English coins had these words engraved on it: "It shall be lifted up in glory," as though to tell us that money should be used for the glory of God.

In closing Canon Malone kindly offered to hold a corporate communion service for the members of the Alexandra Society on Thursday of Whitson Week, May 28th, at 7.45 a.m. in St. Peter's Cathedral, which service the Society gladly accepted.
