From Summerside he went west and continued his career as Station Agent in various places and later took up farming. He is now in business with his two brothers, Norman and Louis. ## Noted Preacher At Basilica During Lent

The course of Lenten sermons at St. Dunstan's Basilica this year will be preached by Rev. Dr. F. P. Lyons of Chicago, one of the most distinguished members of the Paulist Order. Father Lyons was born in Syracuse, N. Y. and graduated from Colgate University in 1905. After teaching Modern Languages in the Army and Navy Preparatory School, Washington, D.C., until 1908 he entered the Paulist Order and was ordained in St. Paul's Church, New York City in 1912. For six years he was professor of Philosophy in St. Paul's College, Washington, D. C., and for three years he'd the chair of Moral Theology in the same institution. He was then sent to Rome as Rector of the famous Church of St. Susanna, the rendezvous of all American and English tourists in Rome.

After four years spent in Rome, he returned to the United States as Superior of St. Paul's College, Washington, and later became Vice Rector of the Apostolic Mission House of the Paulist Fathers in Washington. Since 1929 he has been stationed in Chicago, Ill. Father Lyons holds an enviable record in scholastic studies, being a Master of Philosophy and Bachelor of Theology and Canon Law of the Catholic University of America, and received his doctorate of theology in Rome, Italy. He is a member of the Phi Beta Kappa (Honor Society) of Colgate University, and founded the Convent's League of Catholic Daughters of America in 1928.
