MONTREAL, Oct. 11.—Cattle receipts, 1,940.

There was a fair percentage of medium to good quality butcher cattle in the offering but at time of writing not enough sales of any kind had been recorded to form a basis for quotations. A couple of lots of good steers were sold for \$6.25 and some heavy northwest cows for \$4.75. One lot of good young cows medium heifers and light steers brought \$5.00 and a lot of plain cows, light heifers and a couple of common steers brought \$3.75. Canners were sold at \$1.50 to \$1.75. Calf receipts 1,850. Good veal calves were very scarce and the few offered brought from \$10.25 to \$11.50, with a top of \$12.00 paid for an odd individual calf picked out. Grassers ranged from \$3.50 to \$4.25 with the bulk \$3.85.

Quotations—Cool veal \$10.25 to \$12.00. Medium \$7.00 to \$8.00, low \$6.00 to \$6.75, grass \$3.50 to \$4.25. Sheep receipts 3,725. Over a thousand good quality lambs were sold for \$11.25 and one load of choice black faced lambs brought \$11.50 or better. Medium and poor quality lambs sold from \$10.50 to \$11.00. All buck lambs were weighed out separately at \$1.00 per hundredweight discount on the advance quotations. Sheep sold from \$3.00 to \$6.00.

### "Grand Duchess" Film Is Frisky Comedy Success

SMOOTH ACTING AND SUBTLE DIRECTION CHARACTERIZE SUMPTUOUS PRODUCTION AT THE PRINCE EDWARD.

The latest comedy opus from the Paramount organization, "The Grand Duchess and the Walter", which opened at the Prince Edward last night, may well be characterized as a triple triumph. It is certainly a triumph for Malcolm St. Clair, the rising young directorial genius, who has taken this frisky French stage success by Alfred Savoir and transferred it to the silver sheet with the regal opulence of a De Mille and the Continental-sophistication of a Lubitsch. It is a decided triumph for Adolphe Menjou, whose smooth and polished performance of the wealthy Parisian boulevardier masquerading as a waiter is the finest exposition of screen artistry the current season has produced. It is assuredly a triumph for Florence Vidor, who looks ravishingly beautiful in her new French bob and startling array of fashionable gown creations, and who plays the role of the haughty and fascinating Grand Duchess with the charm and poise and consummate skill of a seasoned trouper. These two, Menjou and Miss Vidor, hold the center of the stage throughout the unreeling of the picture and provide a continuous succession of laughs and chuckles. The plot, though of light substance, has been so deftly handled by St. Clair that it becomes a matter of considerable interest in itself and keeps the audience wondering what's coming next and how it's all going to end. The action hinges on Menjou's coquettishness as a waiter and later as a member of the Duchess's personal staff. The idea of falling in love with a servant is unthinkable to the Duchess, and yet there is something about Menjou that piques her curiosity and stirs her emotions. But the waiter's love-making finally sweeps away all barriers. Even then her pride prompts her to run away, but a persistent search and a complete explanation bring happy results.

### "THE BREAK-AWAY"

By ("TEC")

On Thursday, Oct. 14th, Messrs. S. F. Doyle and L. B. McMillan, President and Secretary respectively of the Maritime Province Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada leave for Amherst where a special meeting of the said organization takes place. It was said that at the last annual meeting several items of business passed without the proper constitutional authority.

Several athletic clubs in Saint John wish to break away from the Maritime Branch and form a provincial association, and strange to say it is alleged the prime mover in this athleticism is C. M. Covey, present Vice President of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, and who for many years was President of the Maritime Branch. Why he should be anxious for a separation is hard to fathom out, when one considers that this gentleman has cost the Maritime body several thousands of dollars while it's chief, travelling here and there in the interests of Maritime athletics—and then suddenly to change his mind, it looks as if there is something "rotten in Denmark."

I wonder is it because of the fact that at the annual meeting of the M. P. B. a resolution was passed asking that he be barred from all committees pertaining to sport in the Maritimes. Another strange instance is the action taken by most of the Halifax city clubs when another past president, Mr. A. C. Mille, it is reported, is mooted the conditions under his regime is rather too ridiculous to venture a statement as to why the wily gentleman should seek the change.

Taking sport in general there has never been such organization in athletic enterprises since the inception of the Maritime Branch. Hockey is now controlled by the M. A. H. A. and at no time was it on a par with conditions as existed last winter.

Baseball in Nova Scotia is controlled by the Baseball Association and we all know with what perfect organization the different leagues are carried on. To date there has been no hitch in the execution of their many programs. Next year it is the intention of the M. P. B. executive to have a similar organization in New Brunswick which it is hoped will do away with the numerous petty disputes that may arise among several of the clubs (especially city clubs) during next season.

In track and field the Y. M. C. A. of Moncton was granted the M. P. B. Championships in August, and to anyone who was present they were a decided success.

The question now arises—What benefit would these provincial organizations be to sport and why should a few clubs in the cities of Saint John and Halifax wish to get in control? However there is one thing certain, that if same should weaken the athletic organizations of smaller towns will surely get little sympathy from those of the cities named. It looks to me that on account of the prestige in all branches of amateur athletics gained by the athletes of the smaller towns that the "big would-be moguls" of Saint John and Halifax are daily growing jealous.

When was amateur sport in Cape Breton ever on the basis as it is controlled by the Maritime Branch? The Highland Games in Antigonish, weren't they a howling success? Take Westville, a small mining town with the Maritime baseball championship tucked under her belt. Truro, another small town with the Maritime hockey championship, a feat duplicated by the victorious hockey team from Sussex, another small town.

It looks as if there is a reason why Halifax and Saint John Clubs would like to break away. Further, why have the "Big Moguls" done Montreal; Chas. Allan, Toronto; in the matter of setting reinstated L. Dalsiel, Moncton; W. J. Dal many of our best Maritime athletes Ziel, Moncton; J. Cooper, Moncton.
