Alleged Jehovah Witness Case Arouses Interest In S'ide Police Court

A packed court room witnessed the trial in the Summerside Police Court yesterday morning of Alexander Cere on a charge of violating a town by-law against peddling without a licence. The prosecution concluded its case yesterday and the defence will be heard today.

The accused, who is being defended by a lawyer from Toronto, Mr. Glen How, is alleged to be a member of the sect known as Jehovah's Witnesses. His wife, Elma Cere is charged with a similar offence and her trial will proceed at the conclusion of her husband's.

The hearing yesterday was punctuated by exchanges between the Magistrate, E. H. Strong, K.C., and Mr. How. On two occasions the Magistrate threatened to bar him from the case if he did not cease his numerous objections.

The accused pleaded not guilty subject to objections taken by counsel to the effect that the Court does not have jurisdiction to hear the case as the by-law is unlawful and null, and that the form of the information is unlawful and insufficient. The Court stated that these objections would be considered.

Other Witnesses

Dan Perry, Summerside, said that the accused had come to his house and asked if he were interested in a Bible, that he had Catholic Bibles for sale at \$3.00 each and he would give him time to pay for one. He told of the accused coming to his house at another time but he did not receive him.

Chief of Police Peter White testified that he had seen the accused going from house to house and said that as far as he knows he is not employed. He said the accused did not have a license to do business and that the Watch Tower Bible Society has no license either.

The cross examination by Mr. How was halted until interrupted by the Magistrate, but did not bring out any new matter except that the accused is an Austrian and is not naturalized in this country.

Mr. T. L. Compton was associated with Mr. How as a defence attorney.
