AT ST. JAMES' YESTERDAY

Eloquent Sermon by Rev. D. M. Lamont

At St. James Church yesterday morning Rev. D. M. Lamont preached a very eloquent sermon. His subject was "What shall I do with Jesus?" (Matt. 27: V 22) and was along the following lines:

The procurator of Judea was a busy man and would far rather be relieved of this fearful question, "What shall I do with Jesus?" than attend to the social functions to attend to. But the claims of Jesus break right through his other anxieties and demand an answer. He little knew that this strange presence standing that day before his judgment seat was the best thing that made his life worth remembering. Pilate tried many schemes to evade his responsibility but he was forced at last in a kind of agony to ask, "What shall I do with Jesus?"

There is an inexorable destiny in this for every one of us. You are forced to ask this question just as truly as Pilate. "What shall I do with Jesus?"

Let us watch Pilate trying to answer it and see whether any of us have tried to answer it like him.

His first answer was I shall do nothing. He thought that an easy answer. Many in our churches think the easiest answer to the call of Jesus is silence. "We are not against Christ nor against our religion only don't trouble us, don't question us." So said Pilate to the Jews. "Take Him and judge Him."

But Herod sent Him back to Pilate. He was bringing Him to the bar of his conscience—to the bar of thy responsibility.

Today the church is bringing this same Jesus to the bar of every man's judgment and we are asking "What will thou do with Jesus who is called Christ?"

The Romans were clever tacticians. Pilate thought he discovered an escape. Was not Christ of Herod's jurisdiction. He sent Him to Herod. Yes commit the cause of Christ to others. It matters not what Herod will do with Him so long as you get rid of Him. But Herod sent Him back to Pilate. Yes Christ will come back and meet you again and force you to ask what shall I do with Jesus Pilate might criticize Herod had he condemned Christ. Many who shirk their own responsibilities (think they can with all the more freedom criticize those who are trying honestly to face this question. But Pilate is once more forced to confront Jesus.

Roman historians paint the character of Pilate black. The scripture shows in him a human touch of kindness and conscience. He would befriend Jesus. Yes He would befriend Him if it costs us nothing.

We have great sympathy with Pilate because we see him so like ourselves. See the mighty forces that are struggling in his heart as Jesus stands before him. His wife sends him a message. She had a vision. It was really a warning from God. But just when he would almost plead with the Jews they warn him that any favour shown to Jesus might hurt his official interests. If you had Pilates ear for a moment you would say "O Pilate what does it matter if you lose Caesar's favor and gain God's mercy."

Pilate's scheming policy would now seem another expedient. There is Barabbas. He would place Jesus and Barabbas side by side and surely the Jews would not bind Jesus who went about doing good and let loose the robber. But don't be surprised at their choice. You see it every day. The evil nature in men, eye sometimes in Christians is let loose and the sweet influences of Jesus choose.

They choose Barabbas and they cry of Jesus "Crucify Him!"

And now the moral stand of Pilate is broken. He makes one more effort but it is a shameful one. Oh this dangerous middle course—this compromising with Christ's enemies! Pilate says "I will let Jesus be scourged just to please them. I will have Him crowned with thorns. Surely those blood thirsty enemies will be satisfied when they see the blood on his brow from the piercing of the crown." Pilate says to the Jews "Behold the man!" Are you satisfied? They answer "Crucify Him!" There is an old saying "No sin is bad enough to satisfy
