NO TRACE OF JAS. MAHAR

PORT WILLIAM, Ont., Jan. 21.—With the recall of the two tugs which were searching the shores of Thunder Bay for James Mahar, Cook County commissioner, lost in a gasoline launch since December 28, hope that he may be discovered is virtually at an end. There are still some Indians and dog teams exploring the north shore, but without success so far. Major Miller and Lieut. Westover are still at the head of the lakes with their airplane and are making daily flights along the shores of the main lake and the islands, but have seen no signs of the missing man.
