

RED ARMY ANNOUNCES EVACUATION OF KHARKOV

Factories, Raw Materials Moved To Safe Place

Series of fierce German attacks beaten off on Moscow front.

MOSCOW, Oct. 30—(Thursday)—(AP)—The Red army announced evacuation of Kharkov today but claimed 120,000 German officers and men were killed in fighting for the Ukraine industrial city.

The Germans reported capture of the city Saturday. The early morning communique issued by the Soviet bureau of information and transmitted by official wireless said also that a series of fierce German attacks on the Moscow front had been beaten off by Soviet troops.

It said fighting continued in the Volokolamsk, Mozhaisk and Maloyaroslavets areas of the Moscow defenses, all of which had been mentioned in previous communiques.

The Germans planned to capture Kharkov as early as September, but these plans of the German command remained on paper, the communique said.

Local man on Monetary reform Group Executive

WINNIPEG, Oct. 29—(CP)—Premier William Abernethy of Alberta late today was chosen president of the Democratic Monetary Reform Association of Canada as supporters of the new movement elected national officers on the final day of their three-day convention here.

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Hanson charges Parliament is Debating society

Declares Premier King "Ignores Parliamentary Fashion."

TORONTO, Oct. 29—(CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King's attitude to Parliament is comparable to the totalitarianism prevailing in Europe today, Hon. R. B. Hanson, Conservative house leader, said in a speech here today.

"As the months go by Parliament assemblies, by reason of the Prime Minister's attitude to it is reduced to the status of a debating society," Mr. Hanson said. "When you consider the advances which are being made in Canada toward the totalitarian state, especially remembering what is now being done in the economic field, it means that the representatives of the people no longer count in the government of Canada."

"A substantial amount of regimentation may be necessary in wartime, but when a man, especially a so-called Liberal such as Mr. King, takes on himself the regimentation of production on the eve of the assembling of Parliament, then I say we have reached a state of totalitarianism, that is only equalled by that to be found in Europe today."

"The representatives of the people go through the form of voting supply but their opportunity of helping to win the war is limited to this function."

Turning to the question of conscription for overseas service, Mr. Hanson said that this must be brought about by the force of public opinion rather than through its advocacy by the Conservative party.

"To make it a political movement would defeat the very purpose of those who have it in view," Mr. Hanson said. He added that a larger Canadian army was needed.

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Rumanians see Their job in War finished

WITH THE RUMANIAN ARMY OF OCCUPATION AT OKHAKOV, ON THE BLACK SEA, Soviet Russia, Oct. 29—(Delayed)—(AP)—Rumanian troops stationed in this area believe the Russian war is over as far as they are concerned.

His Rumanian authorities said the main Rumanian advance had ended at the west bank of the Bug River, which runs almost parallel to the 1939 Dnieper River frontier, 50 to 700 miles deep in the Ukraine.

Their statement was interpreted to mean that Rumanian territorial ambitions had been realized.

Now that Odessa has been taken, many of the concentration troops expect to return home.

(Several recent roundabout Balkan reports, usually by way of Turkey, have mentioned Rumanian unrest and a desire to quit the war.)

The Rumanians have announced heavy casualties amounting to 111,000, while Russian estimates of Rumanian losses have run as high as 250,000.

(Anywheres from 100,000 to 350,000 men might be included in the three corps remaining in the campaign Rumania was re-evicted to mobilized about 1,000,000 men at the start of the offensive.)

Soviets have Great need For planes

Russians Hope For Mild Winter To Bog Down Nazis.

TEHRAN, Iran, Oct. 29—(AP)—Russia has suffered a heavy defeat thus far in the war, but is not finished and desperately needs new planes to challenge Germany's air superiority, expert foreign observers said tonight on reaching here by Soviet passenger plane from Khabyshev, auxiliary Red capital.

Col. Ivan Yeaton, United States military attaché to Moscow for two years, arrived on the same plane and left by train for the Persian Gulf en route to Washington to report on the Russian military situation. He refused comment.

"There is no talk yet among the Communists of a separate peace with Germany," one observer said. "They are hoping for a mild winter to bog down the Nazis interminably in the mud, but despite German transport difficulties they expect them to keep smashing away regardless of the weather, especially in the south."

"The Red air force has taken hard blows and practically all Soviet aircraft presently in service is obsolete. The planes are flown by highly-skilled pilots who are as good as or better than the Nazis, but the latter have put 1,000 planes into action in a sector where the Russians may have 100. The Russian planes moreover are older, slower and under-gunned."

Permanent possession of a beautiful silver cup was won this year by Lorne Valley School when for the third time in a row it merited the trophy given annually for the district showing the greatest improvement in the beautifying of the school grounds and building. 200 Serbians killed In pitched battle

BERNE, Oct. 29—(AP)—Two hundred insurgent Serbians were reported today to have been killed in a night-long battle with regular Axis occupation troops near the Yugoslav village of Belovitch.

Disputes to the Belgrade newspaper Novo Vreme said the insurgents were surrounded by troops when the fight assumed the character of a "veritable battle."

At dawn the fight continued with the greater part of the insurgent band destroyed. The newspaper said it claimed that the insurgents were Communists and that only a few escaped. It mentioned no losses among the regular troops.

Fresh light on Kearny torpedoing

Unseasonable rains and early snows, advance guards of Russia's long winter, have momentarily taken the blitz out of Hitler's attack on Moscow, but southward at Rostov his shock troops have the door to the Caucasus and its oil treasures at least ajar.

Preparations to destroy and abandon the city on the north bank of the Don estuary are reported from Russian sources. Yet the Don itself, from its many mouths 400 miles east and north to its close approach to the lower Volga, provides a moated front to back a direct Nazi advance upon Russia's Caspian oil sources.

Presumably abandonment of Rostov in ruins would fore-shadow a Red retreat behind the lower reaches of the Don. Its width and depth from Rostov to the sea, some 25 miles, has thus far prevented expansion of the Rostov frontal attack still limited to the north bank. The terrain below Rostov south of the river is a formidable barrier to mechanization of warfare even if the river itself could be crossed in the face of Russian fire.

Eastward of the city, the report showed, the Kearny had been escorting one convoy, the direction and nationality of which were not given, when she received information another convoy was under attack "from several German submarines."

Italians Admit Troops Halted Eight Days

Put on defensive by fierce Russian counter-attacks

ROME, Oct. 29—(AP)—The Italian Stefani news agency reported today that Italian troops on the eastern front had been halted and put on the defensive for the last eight days by Russian counter-attacks.

An Italian column fighting in the Stalino zone of the Ukraine front was heavily engaged by Russian infantry supported by artillery, the dispatch said.

"The enemy launched a very strong counter-attack, investing our column from the flanks and attempting to strike it from the rear," Stefani continued.

"The column had not had a moment's peace and rest in eight days." The dispatch said Russian attacks and aerial bombardments were "furious," but claimed that the Italian troops "never ceded a millimetre of ground."

Hitler's paper Seeks to explain Reign of terror

LONDON, Oct. 29—(CP)—Folkischer Beobachter, Hitler's newspaper, sought today to "explain" the reign of terror imposed upon Bohemia-Moravia by references to the "scale of anti-German activity which the Gestapo had to cope with."

The British Broadcasting Corporation reported tonight: "Claiming that counter-measures were not severe in proportion to the danger, the newspaper said opposition did not come suddenly to a head, but began months ago 'like an avalanche.'"

The paper contended that generals of the former Czechoslovak army plotted to organize an armed force and that all "agitators and saboteurs" were incited by the London radio.

Plan campaign To correct Malnutrition

TORONTO, Oct. 29—(CP)—Dr. E. W. McHenry, head of the Department of Nutrition, University of Toronto, said today a widespread campaign is being planned throughout Canada by the Dominion Department of Pensions and Health to correct serious nutrition deficiencies among Canadian children.

Dr. McHenry was commenting on a report from Harrisburg, Pa., that "amazing diet deficiencies" have been uncovered among school children from rich and poor homes in a six-year study of a group of typical communities in Pennsylvania.

Dr. McHenry said he thought a similar survey in Canada would reveal the same deficiencies as found in Pennsylvania.

"We know from surveys in the cities of Halifax, Quebec, Edmonton and Toronto that children are not getting enough calcium," he said, "and I think the same would apply also to the protein. These are the most difficult to purchase. But the chief lack comes from the fact that these children are not getting sufficient milk, consequently they lack calcium."

"It is to meet this situation that plans are being made for a campaign to spread educational nutritional campaign."

Name Administrator For retail trade

OTTAWA, Oct. 29—(CP)—Appointment of Edgar Gordon Burton of Toronto, general manager of the Robert Simpson Co., as administrator of retail trade, was announced today by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

First of the administrators to be named in connection with the recently announced price ceiling program, Mr. Burton will supervise retail prices.

Servicemen's vote Causes no change In N. S. results

HALIFAX, Oct. 29—(CP)—Full returns from the servicemen's voting in the Nova Scotia general election, made public tonight, showed it effected no change from the result of the civilian balloting that indicated election of 23 Liberals, four Conservatives and three Co-operative Commonwealth Federation members.

The count from the 31 polls scattered through the province changed pluralities slightly in almost all cases, but no riding did it serve to overthrow the election of any member whose return was indicated in last night's count of the civilian voting.

In the riding where the closest fight was waged—Queens—the soldier vote left the Liberal plurality intact.

Churchill tells Boys to never, Never, give in

HARROW, England, Oct. 29—(CP Cable)—Prime Minister Churchill today told the boys of Harrow, his old school, that "the lesson to be derived from recent experiences is never to give in—never, never, never."

"Not in any event great or small, large or petty; never except to conviction and good sense," he said. "Never yield to force, never yield to the growing and apparently overwhelming might of the enemy."

Recalling his last visit to the school 10 months ago, the Prime Minister said Britain then was standing alone.

"We were poorly armed but we are not so poorly armed today," he said. "We stood alone and to many countries it seemed our account was closed and our history finished, liquidated."

"But our country stood in the gap. There was no flinching. By what seemed almost a miracle outside these islands we now find ourselves in a position where we can expect victory if we only persevere."

Report 1,000 Jews Ar : machine-gunned

LONDON, Oct. 29—(CP Cable)—More than 1,000 Jews were reported to have been machine-gunned by Nazi troops near Lomza in northern Poland and several hundreds were killed in southern Poland, Reuters News Agency said tonight, quoting Polish reports.

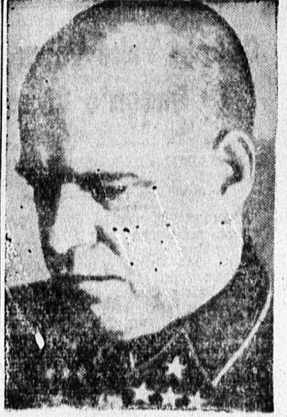

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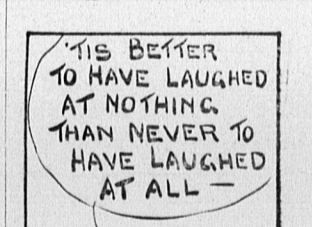

New law forbids French listening To British radio

VICHY, Oct. 29—(AP)—A new law to be announced tomorrow will prohibit Frenchmen from listening either publicly or privately to British and certain other foreign radio broadcasts under threat of severe penalties.

Tonight's advance notice did not specify the other foreign stations which were "described as those which for several months have been broadcasting violent anti-French propaganda."

The announcement said the purpose of the law was to protect those who are likely to be troubled by these lying news stories since they have neither the time nor means of verifying their correctness.

Penalties included six-month closings of public places, a fine of 10,000 francs (nominally about \$200), and jail sentences up to two years.

Mail polish May go next

TORONTO, Oct. 29—(CP)—J. Douglas Lorimer, Canadian wartime chemical controller, said here today that within the next few months he may have to deprive women of the bright-hued varnish they use on their fingernails. He also may have to act similarly with some of their hair beauty preparations, he said.

"But there will be lots of soap made from there is now," he said. "I am having more soap made than I can get more glycerine."

Glycerine is a by-product of soap concerning the fingernail polish, it was explained that the polish contains acetone which is scarce and such is needed for war purposes. Likewise most skin preparations contain glycerine and glycerine is scarce.

"My rule is simply this—that where a product is definitely required for a war purpose, the civilian has to go without it."

10,000 Jews to be resettled

BERLIN, Oct. 29—(AP)—Transfer of 40,000 Jews from Prague to settlement areas in Nazi-occupied lands to the east has been started, and all Jews are to be cleared out of Bohemia-Moravia areas within a short time," Diemrich Deutschland disclosed tonight.

The commentary declared that Jewish transports were leaving regularly but did not give their final destination. Of the 200,000 Jews in the protectorate when it was taken over by Germany in March, 1939, only 90,000 are left, Diemrich said.
