#### FIGHTING SMALLPOX.

St. JOHN, Nov. 20.—While there is no  
sign of further spread of smallpox, and  
no new cases have been reported for several  
days, the municipal council of St. John  
county and city, which met to-day, took  
strong measures for exterminating the  
disease. The sum of \$4,000 was voted to  
meet the past expenditure. A further  
sum of \$2,000 was asked by the board of  
health to meet prospective expenses, with  
\$3,000 added for possible emergencies.
