The total supply of milk received during the last season was 3,204,930 lbs. Cheese manufactured reached 399,303 lbs. The value \$31,011. An 8 per cent dividend was paid shareholders, and \$247, placed to rest account. Next year the Association will run a branch in Hamilton. This factory is built with every known improvement and equipped with the best plant. In short, it is one of the best of the kind in Canada.
