Batty made reference to the fact that one of the choir members—Capt. W. A. McKee—would shortly leave Moncton, and would proceed with the Canadian Military Contingent to London (England) for the Coronation Ceremonies.

One of Charlottetown's oldest citizens passed into the Great Beyond yesterday in the person of Ewen Stewart, Water Street, formerly of St. Peter's Road. The deceased was stricken with paralysis from the effects of the flu he did not recover.

Mr. Stewart was a man who, in his prime, was possessed of a remarkable physique, a quality which he retained to a marked degree up to a few years ago. In his earlier life he travelled through the Southern States and he had a fund of narratives of his experiences and the conditions of life in that country which were most entertaining.

Besides his sorrowing life partner he leaves to mourn one son, James W., of Paton & Co., and to these their many friends will tender sympathy in which The Guardian joins.

The fourth meeting of the Quarterly Official Board of the Pownal Methodist Circuit was held on Tuesday, May 16th. The following stewards were elected by ballot: Sam Noy, Giles H. Jenkins, Austin G. Judson, Alfred D. Brehaut, Wm. Wood, Percy Mitchell, James Farquharson, Giles H. Jenkins was elected recording steward for the ensuing year.

The financial report showed an increase in subscriptions for ministerial support, and the average public collections slightly above those of last year. The general mission fund for the year is \$120, while the W.M.S., at Pownal has raised \$61.70 and the Mt. Herbert and Clifton Auxiliary has raised \$62.60. Gladys E. M. Styles has become a life member of the Mission Band. The report of the Ladies Aid Society was not presented, but it has done nobly during the year in painting, furnishing, etc., to the parsonage. The meeting adjourned till the first week in June in order to complete schedules and reports and to secure the amount necessary to balance the account.
