Britain Offers Troops To Patrol The Saar Basin

GENEVA, Dec. 5.—France today said flatly she will send no troops into the Saar Basin—and Great Britain promised to help police the territory during the forthcoming plebiscite if Germany is willing. Thus, with spectacular suddenness, the League of Nations Council found an apparent solution of the problem that brought it into extraordinary session, the matter of keeping the peace in the little European " tinder-box " that votes Jan. 13 to rejoin Germany, join France or remain under the League.
