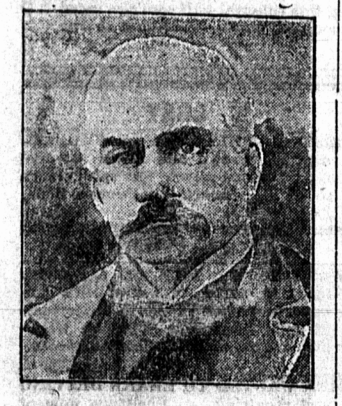


PIERPONT MORGAN DIED IN ROME

During the Latter Years of His Life was Financial Dictator of the United States and a Leading Figure in the World History

ROME, March 31.—J. Pierpont Morgan died at five minutes after twelve. He was within a few days of 76 years of age.
