There were a few nice pumpkins which sold from 30c to 60c; squash about 25c. There was no change in prices of vegetables. Fish was rather scarce; haddock and fresh and corned cod sold at 7c; mackerel from 15c to 30c according to size. Hay sold at \$1.75 to 1.85.

LINEMAN HURLED TO DEATH.—Rodger Green, 35, a grandson of the late Richar Carver of Lyndale, P. E. I., and nephew of Mr. Mark Carver of the same place was killed almost instantly about 4.30 o'clock yesterday afternoon when his body, in contact with live wires of a 55-foot pole, received the full force of a 22,000 volt current, knocking him from the pole. The accident occurred at West Tenth street and Grand avenue, where Green was superintending a gang of linemen working for the Southern California Edison Company according to Howard Hall and Frank O'Rourke, fellow workmen. Green had climbed to the top of the pole and was engaged in transferring live wires from an old pole to a new one. His clothing, wet with perspiration, probably touched one of the wires according to their theory, and created the contact which resulted in Green's death. The men rushed Green to the Receiving Hospital, where he was pronounced dead. Green lived at 644 East Tenth street. He was survived by his wife. The body is being held by the Highland Park Undertaking Company pending funeral arrangements.

Doll House de Luxe to be Given to Queen

LONDON, Sept. 3.—A number of distinguished artists and decorators are combining to create a model miniature house which will be expressive of the art of the time. It is for presentation to Queen Mary, who is taking the liveliest interest in the details.

This doll's house is to be about eight feet high and designed and furnished to represent domestic civilization of 1921. The artists will paint miniature portraits of the Royal family for the walls, and other paintings for the ceilings. Sculptors will make tiny statues, and London's most expert decorators will design and execute the furnishings.

CORKSCREW WEDDING RING

At a recent wedding the bridegroom forgot the ring. The best man stepped forward and handed the clergyman a key with the handle of which the bridal couple were formally "joined together."

Many bridegrooms have experienced the agony of discovering that they have lost the precious gold circlet, and in the London church the clergyman keeps a number of small brass rings for use in cases of emergency.

A well-known comedian was married with the aid of a baby's comforter, with which a nursemaid in the congregation came to the rescue. Anything in the form of a circle is a legal substitute for a wedding ring, and the handle of the comforter served the purpose.

At a village wedding the bridegroom dropped the ring down a grating in the aisle. Appealed to for a substitute, the best man produced a screw-in used ordinarily for hanging pictures, and with this the marriage was solemnized.

A London registrar married a couple by joining them the rim of his spectacles, the lens of which he had removed. Another registrar solemnized a marriage ceremony in which the ring handle of a corkscrew did efficient duty.
