MONTREAL, Nov. 23 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens suffered their third loss in their last four games when the upsurging New York Rangers, with a free-wheeling attack that may have lacked finesse but matched speed with speed, defeated last year's National Hockey League champions 5-3 Saturday night.

The loss, which left the fourth-place Montrealers only a single point ahead of Rangers, was doubly costly to Canadiens. Big Bill Durnan, four times winner of the Vezina Trophy as the League's low-average goalkeeper, was injured early in the second period and forced to leave the game.

With the second period scarcely five minutes old, Cal Gardner swept in on Durnan and was hooked by Jacques Locas as he shot Durnan slid out to make the save but Gardner, upset by Locas and coasting in on his back with skates flashing, caught Durnan over the left eye.

Blowing fresh, Durnan was carried to the dressing room where eight stitches were taken in the deep cut. He was sent home.

TORONTO, Nov. 23 (CP)—For the third straight time, Toronto Argonauts won their way into the Dominion football final with a 22-1 victory over Ottawa Trojans at Varsity Stadium Saturday.

The Trojans, with little more than an spirit to match the swift Argos striking power and the stout defence, never gave up trying. Blocked along the ground, they juggled the ball in a weird aerial attack that at times reached brilliance in its desperation and produced the only point scored on Argos in 180 minutes of playoff football.

The Trojans fell before an Argos machine that never ran smoother. With a crowd of about 15,000—some 4,000 short of capacity—watching, the Argos opened up on the fast field with a three-touchdown attack. They had their first major within seven minutes of the start and led 13-0 at halftime.

Dal Captures Intercollegiate Rugby Title

SACKVILLE, N.B., Nov. 23 (CP)—Dalhousie University captured the Maritime intermediate rugby championship Saturday with a 6-3 win over Mount Allison's second varsity team after two overtime periods became necessary to break a 3-3 deadlock.

Although they controlled most of the play against a more experienced and heavier squad, the Mounties relaxed pressure momentarily and lost when Dalhousie snatched the opportunity. Gordon Quigley went over the line with two minutes to go.

With two inches of snow covering the field, an unusual sight occurred when the ball was placed against a small snowdrift for the kickoff. The snow caused numerous fumbles and inaccurate kicks. None of the convert attempts was successful and all penalty kicks of the snow-laden ball fell short.

Referee Roy MacDonald awarded the high total of 31 penalty kicks, including 18 to Mount Allison.

After a scoreless first half, John Henderson faked through the whole visiting team and passed to Don MacLellan for the opening try. Then Dalhousie put on pressure and Quigley tied the game shortly before the end of regular playing time.
