PLENTY OF FISH IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

HALIFAX, Feb. 7.—Sir Michael Cashin, who with Lady Cashin is passing through Halifax on his way to New York, when seen last night, said that there was no significance in his trip. He commented with a smile on the recent developments politically in Newfoundland, remarking that the Premier and Receiver-General who recently ran bye-elections had been narrowly returned by small majorities. He attributed their close elections in some part to labor movements. Asked as to Newfoundland's trade he said that matters were in fair condition. There were 700,000 quintals of fish in the colony, however, which lacking transport to the markets in time for the Lenten season might result in serious loss to the Island.

TORONTO POLICEMEN GET RAISE IN PAY

TORONTO, Feb. 5.—First class constables in this city are to receive salary increases of \$300 a year each, which will bring their salaries up to \$1,850; second class constables will receive \$1,500, an increase of \$200 a year, and third class constables \$1,350 an increase of \$100. These increases were decided upon yesterday by the police commissioners. It is proposed to add 340 men to the police force and these with the salary increases will bring the additional cost of keeping up the force to \$875,000.
