DUG UP POT WITH THIRTY THOUSAND

Farmer Found Money—Is Sued by the Former Owner of Land.

NEW LONDON, Wis., May 16—An iron pot said to have contained \$30,000 was dug up recently on the farm of Louis Hoffman, near here. The farm was sold to Hoffman several years ago by Mrs. John Schmall widow of a prosperous German farmer.

On learning of Hoffman's rich find Mrs. Schmall brought suit to recover the pot claiming that she sold only the farm to Hoffman. The latter has been cited to appear in the Cutagamie county court, that it may be learned how much treasure he found. Hoffman was digging out stumps in a pasture several weeks ago when his pick struck a hard substance. He continued digging and unearthed the kettle. Tearing off the lid, his amazed eyes gazed upon a wealth of good silver and treasury notes. Mrs. Schmall alleges that the money was buried by her husband and for that reason she is entitled to it.

A SHERLOCK HOLMES OF THE PRESENT DAY

The Clever Detective Work Of A Shrewd Officer Who Unravels A Berlin Murder Mystery Link By Link With Pawn Ticket As A Clue.

LONDON, May 16—One of the most brilliant pieces of detective work heard of outside fiction for many a long day has been performed by Detective Inspector Wannowski, of the Berlin police, who on Tuesday morning put his hands on August Heider, a cobbler, aged 43 years and charged him with the murder of a boy named Herman Blecher. On Wednesday, April 8, portions of a dismembered human body were found in a sack in the Berlin Zoological Gardens. Further search disclosed another package of remains, and the police surgeons set to work to put the bodies together. This they did so successfully that it could be recognized as that of a boy about fifteen years of age.

Then Inspector Wannowski carefully examined some rags of clothing found with the mutilated remains. In a piece of lining was a town pawn ticket. This was pieced together, and then the police followed up with the result that it was found that the ticket related to a small article pawned by a boy named Herman Blecher.

The latter Wannowski next discovered had been apprenticed to a tailor, but had run away from his master and had been seen on the night of the murder with two men in a low tavern in the East End of Berlin. Keen on his clue, the detective searched all the slums of the city, and was at last rewarded by the discovery that one of the men with whom the boy had been seen had later been arrested for theft, and was in the Moabit Gaol.

THREE HOURS' CAB CHASE. Interviewed, the prisoner declared that the boy went off with the other man, whose name he did not know, but whom he had occasionally seen in the company of a girl named "Bertha." The latter had told him that she was afraid of the man in question, because he had once attempted to strangle her. "Bertha," had, therefore, to be found and after exhaustive inquiries was discovered in a working infirmary and identified as a girl named Eckardt. She declared that she did not know the stranger's name, but said she believed she could find his lodging where he had tried to choke her if she started out from the "thieves' kitchen" where she had met him.

Accordingly, accompanied by Wannowski, she drove four hours about the "Scheunenviertel" in a cab till finally she hit on the stranger's apartments in the Lieftammanstrasse. The police forced the door and found everything in perfect order, but search in a cupboard brought to light numerous garments saturated with blood and a large butcher's knife. The room also contained a huge block, newly covered with linoleum, on which, it is assumed, the murderer dissected his victim.

The final incriminating proof was an apron of a peculiar gaudy pattern, in which the remains of the boy were wrapped up. This was shown in a way that would not excite the suspicions of Heider's wife, who is in hospital, and she immediately identified it as hers, saying that she had left it in her lodging when taken ill four months ago.

Heider, who is described as a degenerate, subject to morbid propensities, and who had been confined in an asylum was arrested at 2 o'clock in the vicinity of the great fire at the garrison church, being pointed out to the police by the waiter of the tavern where he had been seen by the boy. Heider was drunk when captured, but sobered immediately on being charged with the crime. He strenuously denies his guilt, but the proofs seem overwhelming.

LONDON, Eng., May 16—The panic created in royal and other exalted circles by the Countess of Warwick's promised book of reminiscences appears to increase rather than abate, which indicates that all efforts to induce or compel her to refrain from publishing them have failed.

An extraordinary step has now been taken by the Government in introducing specially stringent clauses into "the officials secrets bill," which make the publishing within forty-two years of such episodes or documents as the countess is believed to propose to include in her book punishable as a criminal offence. But the clauses are so far-reaching and oppressive that they have no chance of passing the House of Commons. The introducing of them is only another attempt in high quarters to frighten the Countess from her alleged project.

However, there is not the remotest chance of diverting her from her purpose by any such device if she has made up her mind, for her determination of character is inflexible. She regards herself as the chosen instrument for exposing and destroying a class of which at one time she was the most brilliant ornament. It is not supposed for a moment that the Countess contemplates publishing anything libellous; she simply intends to give a picture of the idle luxury, ignorance and indifference of the ruling class in England, painted with complete inside knowledge.
