**OTTAWA, Oct. 10—(CP)** — A Trade Department official said here today the government was exploring the possibilities of operating a new ferry service between Bonaventure, N. B., and West Point, P. E. I., but the final decision depended upon the proposition private interests would make to the government.

The official said the matter of whether "The Island" would get a third ferry to link it with the 18-mile-distant mainland was still in the "embryo stage."
