

**SOME CHANGES FOR MARINERS.**  
The gas buoy heretofore moored at the southeastern end of Miscouche shoal, Bedeque bay, south coast of Prince Edward Island, has been moved further southward, and is now located in five fathoms of water.  
From the buoy, Sea Cow head light bears S. 82 deg. E., and light house bears N. 62 deg. E.  
The bell buoy which heretofore marked Tormentine reefs, North-

berland strait, has been placed by a steel can buoy, painted black with "Tormentine reef" in white letters.  
The whistling buoy which heretofore marked Tryon shoal, south coast of Prince Edward Island, has been replaced by a steel can buoy painted red, with "Tryon shoal" in white letters.  
A combined gas and whistling buoy has been established by the government of Canada in mid-straits between Tryon shoal and Tormentine reefs, Northumberland strait.

From the buoy, Carleton head bears N. 5 deg. W. distance 6 1/2 miles. In an point bears S. 32 deg. W. distant 6 1/2 miles, and Jouriman Island lighthouse bears N. 66 deg. W. distant 7 miles.  
The buoy is moored in 12 fathoms of water. It is of steel, cylindrical, quartered black and white, with the words "Mid Channel Northumberland Strait" painted on the buoy.  
The buoy is surmounted by a pyramidal steel frame supporting the whistle and lantern.

The light is a white light, automatically occulted at short intervals. The illuminant is acetylene, generated automatically.  
The whistle is sounded by the motion of the buoy on the waves.

**GOVERNOR-GENERAL HAD NARROW ESCAPE**

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 1.—Earl Grey, governor-general of Canada, who returned here from Dawson and Shagway by the Government steamer Quadra yesterday, had a narrow escape from death when lost in the woods of Jarvis Inlet for five and a half hours on Saturday, August 28, when on a shooting expedition, with other companions, other than his dog. He told of nearly falling over a precipice in the darkness when rescued by a search party, headed by Major Clark, his orderly, and Second Officer Johnston, of the Quadra. One of many search parties sent into the woods after fires were built along the shore to attract attention to the attention of the lost Governor-General. He was utterly exhausted when found, and his clothing was badly torn.

**FLASHES HIS LAST WORD BY WIRELESS**

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—The United Wireless Company, one of whose operators, G. E. Eccles, of Winnipeg, perished when the steamship Ohio sank off the Alaska coast, today received an account of the disaster from Operator Booth at Ketchikan, Alaska, this afternoon. Booth said in the despatch:  
"About 1 a.m., I was sitting with my receivers clapped to my ears, having just finished working with Operator Eccles on board the Ohio, when I was startled to hear him call 'C.Q.D., C.Q.D.' I immediately answered and he sent the following message:  
"Ohio struck a rock. Steamer sinking. Send aid immediately or everybody will be lost."  
"The steamships Humboldt and Rupert of the McKenzie Bros. Steamship Company happened to be near, and both called the Ohio asking for her latitude, and the report flashed back that they would change their course and stand by the Ohio as long as possible.  
"In the meantime Eccles sent another message saying:  
"Ohio sinking fast—cannot hold out, passengers being taken off in small boats. Captain and crew will stick to the last."  
"The Humboldt and Rupert both replied that they were headed for the Ohio and would pick the passengers up. Then came the final message from the stricken vessel:  
"Passengers all off and adrift in small boats," it said, "captain and crew going off in the last boat waiting for me now—good bye."  
"I was unable to get him again," concluded Booth, "and I knew he had gone down with his ship."

**REMARKABLE SWIM OF NEW YORK MAIDEN.**

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—Struggling against a stiff northwest wind and an exceptionally choppy sea, Ethel Due, 17 years old, and her sister, Vera, aged 15, swam across the narrows from Fort Hamilton, yesterday. Another sister, Beatrice, 12 years old, made the start, but after four hours she was picked up 100 yards from the Staten Island shore. She was highly indignant and asserted that she would have finished if left alone.  
Ethel, the last to enter the water and the first to leave it, covered the distance in one hour, twelve minutes. The Narrows is a little more than a mile wide at that point, and it is asserted that the best previous time was one hour, twenty minutes.  
Vera arrived at the Staten Island shore one hour, one minute after her elder sister. She was caught in the outgoing tide and was carried south, finishing half a mile from the place where Ethel had landed.  
Each girl was laugh at the finish and looked fresh enough to repeat the long swim.

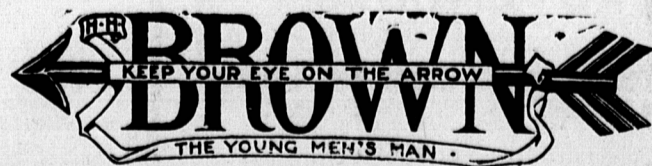

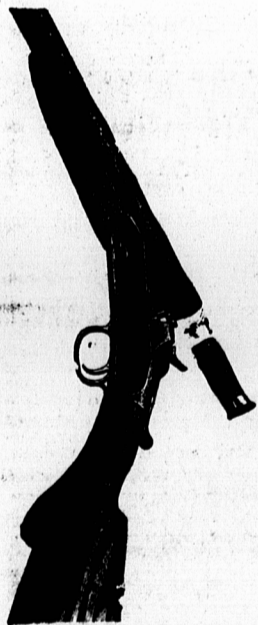
