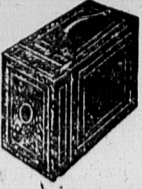

Arnett Loudly Applauded At Great O'Leary Meeting

Conservative Tide Advancing Strongly In Prince County, As Evidenced By Enthusiastic Reception Of Mr. J. Frank Arnett At One Of Largest Political Meetings Ever Held At O'Leary.

The joint meeting at O'Leary on Monday night was another great victory for the Conservative party. The meeting was one of the largest political meetings ever held in Prince County. It was easy to see that the electors of West Prince were looking to Hon. Mr. Bennett for the adjustment of their many claims. The hall was filled to capacity, even the speakers' platform had every available inch of space taken up. The supporters of the Liberal candidate were interrupted with cries of "Why not go to Arnett." Mr. Charles Rogers of Summerside speaking on behalf of Mr. McLean brought down cries of "Bennett! Bennett!" when he referred to Hon. Mackenzie King's visit to the Imperial Conference this fall.

A few of the faithful cheered when Mr. Rogers made mention of the "monuments" all over Prince County to Mr. McLean; but in the main the support of the Liberal party was sadly lacking considering the size of the audience.

The chairman, Mr. Stanford Phillips very ably presided and was courteous and fair to both candidates and their assistants. The meeting at times was more or less noisy but the chairman was on his job and kept the huge gathering in order.

On the platform besides the two candidates, Mr. J. F. Arnett and Mr. A. E. McLean, were Mr. A. F. Arsenault, M. L. A.; Mr. Shelton Sharp, Mr. William H. Dennis, M. L. A., and others.

MR. ARNETT RECEIVES OVATION

Mr. Arnett the Conservative candidate, received a most enthusiastic welcome by the large audience when he arose to speak. He had his subjects well in hand and in a quiet but very convincing manner brought home point after point of the failure of the King Government. In his opening remarks he thanked the people for pinning their faith to him when they nominated him in Summerside last fall. There was prolonged applause when Mr. Arnett said he believed that it would be his pleasure to thank them again after the 28th. He dealt ably with the tariff question explaining how our tariffs are fluctuating at the will of the United States. Our duties go up or down in accordance to the powers that be at Washington. The Bennett policy, Mr. Arnett emphasized, is a policy for a Canadian tariff for the Canadian people. In speaking of the boasted surplus of the Dunning budget, Mr. Arnett said that it was made up of the sales tax, which has a direct effect on the pockets of the people. The withdrawal of the grants for education and other matters were touched upon by Mr. Arnett.

LIBERAL CANDIDATE

Mr. McLean who was the first speaker appeared to be rather nervous and talked rather fast at times to cover his ground. He rambled through a long discussion on the record of the Liberal Government, for which he had no apology to make. The Dunning Budget, reduced taxation, Trade Treaties, British Preference, settlement of Western Provinces, soldiers settlements, Old Age Pensions; adjustment of the steel and coal duties mentioned in the Duncan report were all taken up by Mr. McLean. He spoke at some length on how his Government had undertaken to settle the claims of Western Canada; but all he had to say with regard to the claims on Prince Edward Island was that the subsidy claims will be adjusted at the proper time. He tried to make the people believe that the Conservative policy is a "made-in-Washington Policy" and the present Dunning Budget a real Canadian budget, which will open the door to greater trade; but his words lacked the conviction necessary to carry the tide his way. Considering the enormous audience in a one time Liberal town, the applause accorded to Mr. McLean was disappointingly small. Mr. McLean had to call to his aid, after attacking and ridiculing the Conservative policies a letter from the Canadian Association at Ottawa in which it was said that the prom-

as they say that a lady can work in her slippers around the wharf and not get her feet wet.

The dissatisfaction of the majority of the returned men was fully discussed by Mr. Arnett. He read a letter from Sir Arthur Currie in regard to the returned soldiers asking that the whole system be revised and taken out of politics. Mackenzie King during his campaign brought it in to politics and took the credit of putting the Pensions Board through but nothing had been done. Positions which should have been given to returned men have in many instances been given to men who could have gone to war but remained at home (hear, hear.) In referring to Mr. MacLean's remarks on Mr. Bennett being a multi-millionaire Mr. Arnett said that Mr. Bennett was a keen business man but on his being chosen as leader of the opposition he resigned from many business connections and devoted his whole time to Canada and the interests of the Canadian people. There were loud cheers for Mr. Bennett at this point in Mr. Arnett's address.

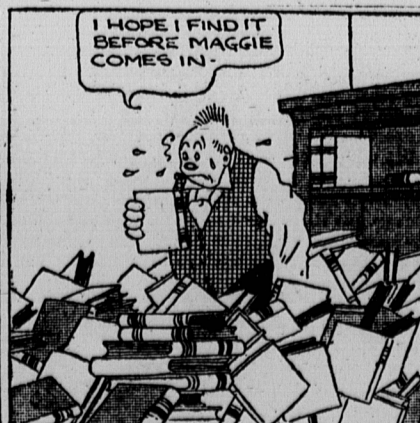
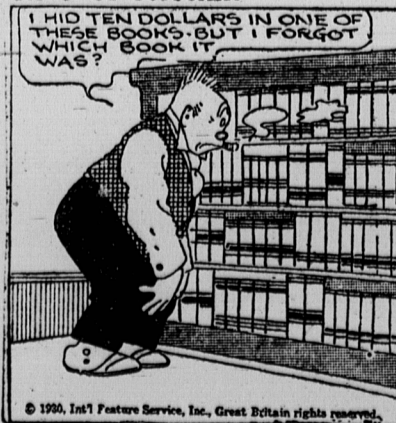
BUTTER SITUATION IMPORTANT

The butter situation brought the heartiest support to the speaker. He said that he did not treat the matter lightly as Mr. McLean had done. When butter was as low as 20 cents per pound it was a very serious matter for the farmer. Mr. Arnett said that in speaking to the manager of a large creamery the other day, the manager had said that butter fat was ten cents per pound less this year. That meant that on 200 pounds of butter there was a loss of \$20,000 to the farmers. Surely something had to be done to help the farmer. He went into all the different phases of the situation as it stands today and received a round of applause as he sat down.
