ANOTHER MID-OCEAN ARREST

NEW YORK, March 16—Wireless messages flashed over the Atlantic for three days by the operator on the American liner St. Louis, which docked today, led to the arrest on the German liner Zeiten of a man who is accused of being the leader of a band which last January, murdered a pawnbroker, his wife, cashier and typist, in the little town of Mielowitz, Russia.

The dramatic capture of the accused slayer after he had escaped the dragnet of the Russian detectives has only one parallel in the police annals of the world, that of Dr. Hawley Harveyrippen.

The prisoner is a man named Zogolowski, who, the Russian police say, is a desperate criminal who has served several terms in jail, although he is only twenty-one years old. Another man named Bernards, who is suspected of complicity in the murders, is believed to be with him on the liner.

Zogolowski was living in a lodging house in Mielowitz at the time of the crime. He was suspected and when he returned home for important papers which he had concealed in his room, the daughter of the boarding house keeper notified the police. A policeman was sent to the house and Zogolowski shot himself and escaped. It was believed that the fugitive would cross the border and seek refuge in Berlin and Otto Bursdorf, sergeant of police of Berlin, was notified.

The sergeant learned that Zogolowski was on the Zeiten. He tried to get into communication with the liner, but failing, hurried across the channel to England, where he boarded the St. Louis at Southampton. His first act was to communicate with the German ambassador in this city by wireless and request him to notify the New York police.

Then the search for the Zeiten was begun. Every hour during the day and night the wireless operator on the St. Louis flashed messages over the sea. He established communication with many vessels which sighted the Zeiten but not until last Wednesday were his efforts rewarded.

A wireless message to the Cunard liner Virginian brought the response that, earlier that day, she had been in wireless conversation with the captain of the Zeiten. At the direction of Bursdorf, a message was relayed to the Zeiten requesting the arrest of Zogolowski.

The next day the wireless operator caught faint message from the Zeiten and finally got a message to her. He carried the response that Zogolowski had been arrested and was in irons.

When the St. Louis docked today Bursdorf by a special permit, boarded the revenue cutter Hudson and went down the bay to meet the incoming liner at quarantine.

WATERSPOUT IN ITALY

ROME, March 16.—A waterspout at Viareggio yesterday unroofed a number of buildings and wrecked many fishing smacks. Two persons were reported as dead.

NEW YORK, March 20—George Munroe was sentenced by Judge Hough, in the U. S. Circuit Court on Saturday, to three years in the Atlanta Penitentiary, after the jury had declared him guilty of using the mails to defraud in selling his Marconi stock and stock in the United Shoe Shining Co.

STRIVING NOW TO GET GOVERNMENTS PURE AS GREECE

NEW YORK, March 16—In an address delivered before the Nomad's Club, at the Edinburgh Cafe, last evening by Frank Taylor, the vice-president, on the "Growth of Federal Government," considerable emphasis was laid on the fact that while enormous advances had been made in science and in all the arts with the possible exception of sculpture, practically no progress had been made in the art of Government since the days of the Greek democracies, whose liberties were crushed out by the despotism that succeeded the free states.

The "Politics of Aristotle and the works of the later Greek historians show how federation grew, the most advanced being the confederacy of the Achaian League, and in which suffrage was universal among males—although the suffrage had not then raised her voice to demand a place in the deliberative assemblies—and in every issue material to the welfare of the people they were the sole arbiters.

It was shown that the tyrannies and despotism that held European countries in bondage from the days of the Roman empire through the dark and middle ages, rendered progress of free institutions and enlightened systems of government impossible, and in our own day they were retarded by the personal ambitions and the desires for wealth on the part of those who achieved positions of honor in the states, and who labored for these things rather than for the welfare of the people as a nation.

As an illustration of this he asked, how often was it the case that the people were denied the opportunity of expressing their views by a referendum on the plea that they did not know so well what was for their true interests as did these servants of the public who were in reality their masters.

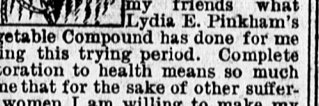
