# RESULTS

## Potato Growers

(Continued From Page One) here cost the Virginia association between \$5.50 and \$6.00 delivered at Norfolk. They pay 85 cents duty to get them into the States—about the price of table stock. Then there are cold storage expenses, as the potatoes must be kept in storage until the planting season. They are planted early and dug up when quite green, and many cars of them are shipped back to Canada, as far east as St. John and Halifax.

The Southern Produce Association covers seven counties and includes 2,700 growers. The Eastern Shore Virginia Exchange is an even larger organization but they do not use as much island seed. Between 40,000 to 50,000 sacks of your potatoes this year if we could get them. Mr. Banks stated, "That is about ten times what you are producing. Don't you see that if this difficulty continues we will be forced to look elsewhere for a supply that will be adequate? We don't want to do this, because your certified stock is the best that we know of, and it is practically free from disease."

Mr. Banks praised the work of Mr. Boulter, secretary of the P. E. I. Potato Growers Association, and Mr. Peppin, plant pathologist at the Experimental Station, for the assistance and encouragement they are giving to the growing of certified seed. "We are doing everything we can to support them because it means almost as much to us as it does to you people here."

Mr. Banks believes that growers are awakening to their opportunity at last and that next year will see a largely increased crop. When the difference between the price paid for table stock and certified seed is considered, it would well seem that the extra care needed to produce the latter is abundantly repaid. He was interested to hear that not only in Virginia but in South Carolina and other parts of the States island seed is being eagerly bargained for.

Mr. Banks leaves this morning for New Brunswick in an endeavor to secure additional supplies that would meet the demands of his growers, who will be planting altogether about 100,000 sacks of seed potatoes.

## "Taxation" Subject Of Address Before The Rotary Club

There was a large attendance at Rotary yesterday, Rotarian H. V. Buntain presiding. Rev. W. Orr Mulligan delivered an interesting address on "Taxation". The secretary announced that Sept. 18 would be Radio Night and that a Rotary message would be broadcasted from New York at 9 o'clock daylight saving time. On motion of Past District Governor Walter Grant it was resolved to invite the District Governor to hold the annual district conference in Charlottetown next April.

Providence and Yarmouth do not wish to press their claims to the honor. Rotarian W. K. Rogers reminded the meeting of the concert by the Welsh singers in aid of the Prince Edward Island Hospital in the Methodist Church next week.

Yesterday's programme included an enjoyable solo by Mr. Ben Acorn. Taxation, Rev. Mr. Mulligan declared in his address was a subject in which all were interested, directly and indirectly. The problem of taxation and his method of solving it, cost King Charles the First his head, and in a later century a question of taxation cost Britain her American colonies.

Over-taxation and inequitable taxation were fundamental causes of the French and Russian revolutions. Today the countries which had been engaged in the world war were suffering severely because the price of the war had now to be paid in enormously increased taxes. Few people like to pay taxes yet all sensible people acknowledge the necessity for them.

The curious thing in many instances was the spirit which wanted governments and municipalities to put in all modern conveniences and to support every passing fad and then when the bill was presented for payment to waver vehemently indignant, at the increased taxation necessary to pay for them. The cost of government in modern federal democracies came high because it was three fold—municipal, provincial and federal—and there were instances where there seemed to be an aggravating overlapping of taxation.

One of the problems of modern taxation was how to prevent the overlapping. In the case of income tax there might be a re-arrangement. The tax on receipts was another case in point where money had to be sent away by means of a money order. Another problem of modern taxation was its simplification. As this was to give a greater definiteness and certainty to some types of taxation developed since the war. A second problem of taxation was proper supervision of collection and expenditure. This,

## Noted Islander Passes Away at Springfield, Mo.

The following extract from the Springfield (Missouri) Leader of Aug. 31st has reference to the death of a noted Prince Edward Islander, a brother of Mrs. Franklin Boyver, of Banbury, P. E. I.

"Milton C. Baker, 59 years old, prominent in local business circles died this morning at his home on East Grand street road at 9 o'clock. He had been seriously ill for the past four weeks.

"Mr. Baker was born Nov. 15th, 1863, at Bedouque, Prince Edward Island, Canada, being the son of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Baker. He moved here with his parents when a small child and resided here continuously since. On Sept. 10th, 1881, Mr. Baker became connected with Keen Country Wholesale Dry Goods company, then located at its present location on South avenue. Starting as office boy, he held various positions with the company and at the time of his death was a stockholder and held the position of treasurer of the concern.

"He had been identified with many business enterprises of the city, being a heavy stockholder of the Springfield Seed Company and also of the Middlewest Millinery company. He was vice-president of the Convention Hall association.

"Mr. Baker was married here 33 years ago to Miss Carrie Pipkin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Pipkin, pioneer residents of the city. To this union was born one child, Carrie, who is now Mrs. Arthur M. Clement, of 1101 Cherry street.

"Beside the widow and daughter, Mr. Baker is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Simon Mason, of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, Mrs. Franklin Boyver of Banbury, Prince Edward Island, and Mrs. T. H. Capp, of St. Joseph; one brother Louis C. Baker of New York City. Mrs. Capp formerly resided here, her husband, Rev. T. H. Capp having been pastor of the First Christian church here for many years.

"Mr. Baker was a cousin of Dr. J. G. Schurman, noted American philosopher and educator, who is at present United States minister to China. He was formerly president of Cornell University.

"Funeral services will be held at the family home on East Grand street road at 10 o'clock Sunday morning. Reverend C. M. Hawke, pastor of the St. Paul M. E. church, will officiate. Burial will follow in Maple Park cemetery, under direction of the Paxon Undertaking company.
