Yesterday afternoon a small squad of men from S. M. S. Bremen, of the German navy, now visiting in Provincial waters, were engaged at Water Street in building a target for use in gun practice. At each port where Bremen's gun crews indulge in practice new targets are built and quite a quantity of lumber is utilized in their construction. Four floats are made about thirty-five feet square and on each of these a row of uprights are placed along the centre. The floats are then placed side by side and chained together. On the row of uprights is attached sheets of very light canvas joined together and thereby is formed a target which is 150 feet long and 25 feet high. As they are replaced by the ships' launches which act as target tenders. The lumber used by the men of the Bremen was purchased from L. M. Poole & Co., City.

Altogether the Y.M.C.A. work will be pushed vigorously at this year's camp and always the efforts of those in charge will certainly be attended by beneficial results. Mr. Riely has the local Y.M.C.A., the tents at the camp and Maritime Y.M.C.A. Camp matters to attend to at present and the coming ten days promise to be strenuous ones for him.

BOSTON, June 26—Members of the city council committee on prisons visited Charles street jail yesterday. Suggestions for the improvement of prison conditions were made to them by Robert L. Davie, the broker now awaiting trial for larceny. These were:

Exercise in yard at least three hours a week for those awaiting trial. Present bathtubs should be replaced with shower baths. Alternate the present cereal drink with cocoa shells. Replace the boiled peas which are now served on Saturday with boiled kidney beans. Mail received for those awaiting trial to be delivered to them unread. Gradually replace the blue and white striped uniforms with suits made of blue denim, which would be much lighter and show which the dirt so much as those now worn. The committee announced that they will give serious consideration to the suggestions.

SLICK "RANCHER" CAUGHT IN WINNIPEG

WINNIPEG, June 26—A young man who says his name is Bradley and claims to be a rancher living near Calgary, has been arrested here after a week of high living for attempting big frauds. He was having copies made of the stamps of various banks and firms and a metal worker who was doing the job for him, became suspicious. He telephoned the police and Bradley was arrested and jailed. Among his operations Bradley had bought a car of lumber, much machinery and a \$3,500 automobile which he planned to pay for with bogus drafts issued against a mythical train load of cattle represented as having been consigned to him.

In the month of May alone the total trade was \$67,748,232, a betterment of \$8,500,000. For that month exports totalled \$30,155,756, a betterment of \$2,000,000, and imports totalled \$43,592,476, a gain of \$4,500,000.

CANADA'S TRADE KEEPS GROWING

OTTAWA, June 26—Canada's trade for the first two months of this year is \$7,000,000 better than for the same period last year, and indicates that the year will show a total trade of considerably more than three-quarters of a billion dollars.

During the two months there were imports totalling \$74,936,779, a betterment of \$5,500,000, while exports of domestic products showed a slight decline, totalling \$31,938,988, or \$1,750,000 less than for the same period last year.

FRENCH AVIATOR FLIES 177 MILES IN 105 MINUTES
