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Rose of Englands Drops As National Emblem of Wales Triumphs

Cardiff City Defeats Arsenal By One To Nothing In Bonus Game For English Cup.

LONDON, April 25.—St. George's Day passed this year with the rose of England drooping and the national emblem of Wales triumphant when, in the annual battle for the English Cup yesterday, Cardiff City defeated Arsenal by a score of one goal to nothing and, for the first time in history, took the famous trophy to Wales. It was a great day for the land on the leek and the number of the Cymry who cheered the victory of Cardiff at the Wembley Stadium ran into many thousands. They made it a festive occasion and the famous football of seats around the tier upon tier was a riot of color with the streamers of the rival teams flapping gaily by their hopeful supporters. King George was present, arriving about half an hour before the kick-off and His Majesty was the recipient of a loyal ovation. The intervening time between the King's arrival and the opening of the game was passed in community singing, in which the Welshmen excelled.

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HARD GAME

Several free kicks to the Londoners kept the Welshmen in hot water, but they survived and carried the game down to Arsenal's end. The metropolitan team had been given many opportunities to score but they lacked that finish which means goals. Eminent Doctors Find That Great Runner is Victim of Hypertrophy

BOSTON, April 25.—Clarence DeMar, world famous athlete and five time winner of the classic Boston Marathon, with a total of 11 wins out of 21 regular marathons, is a victim of hypertrophy it was announced by a board of eminent physicians here today. As the findings of this board have already been sustained by the examining medical board of the Boston Athletic Club, DeMar is automatically banned from future marathon contests. All the time DeMar was plodding along the 26 miles between Hopkinton and Boston last Tuesday to flash across the tape a winner, he was suffering from this hardening of the arteries. The board's findings which caused one of the biggest surprises ever registered in local athletic circles explains the acute distress which DeMar twice complained of during Tuesday's race and which caused him to near quit the contest four miles from the finish. The members of the board which reported their findings on the physical condition of the super-athlete comprised these members of the staff of the Massachusetts General Hospital; Drs. A. V. Duck, D. B. Dill, D. M. Hurxthal and J. S. Lawrence. That their finds will be accepted without a protest by the B. A. A. examining physicians became evident tonight. Dr. John F. H. Connor, of Commonwealth Avenue, one of the Marathon examiners, declared that "Hypertrophy" would automatically bar any entrant from the race. One of the physicians who took part in the examination of DeMar at the Massachusetts General Hospital, explained that DeMar himself had not been informed of the results of their examination. The tests were made, he said, for general scientific purposes, and DeMar presented himself not as a patient but as a voluntary subject for their examination. It is the opinion of the Board that DeMar's greatness as a runner is due, not to his physical fitness, but to a "pathological obsession," a mental feeling that he must run and conquer. In other words, DeMar is a perfect example of the triumph of the mind over the body.

Mayor Walker Offered Job?

NEW YORK, April 25.—If Mayor James J. Walker, of New York, has been offered the presidency of the American League at a salary of \$100,000, neither he nor Bau Johnson, who now holds the post, has heard anything about it, "formally." Word to that effect came today from the office of President Johnson in Chicago, and from the city hall here where the sudden rumor sprang up yesterday that the Mayor had been approached and told he could write his own salary ticket. "I would not discuss any offer until it was formally made," Mayor Walker said. "There's nothing to it," was the assertion of Wm. Harridge, Secretary to Mr. Johnson, who had gone to Excelsior Springs, Mo., for a week-end rest. "It looks like some advertising for Mayor Walker," he added. "American Club owners were as unproductive of information."

Jack and Gene May Again Swap Title Punches

NEW YORK, April 25.—Cauliflower ears closest to the ground have picked up the distinct impression that the next battle for the world's heavyweight championship again will find Jack Dempsey trying to pierce the spell of Gene Tunney's fistful philosophy. "Shaking a significant finger, the 'masses'" profess to see in Tex Rickard's preliminary manoeuvres a plan to bring Jack and Gene together again on the theory that that they will draw the biggest "gate" of any possible attraction. Rickard has made no secret of his desire to have such a match, but he has been equally as insistent that Dempsey first must show whether he is entitled to a return bout by meeting one or more of the survivors of the heavyweight elimination tournament.

Indian Runner Flashes Speed

LAWRENCE, Kansas, April 25.—A quartette of Notre Dame sprinters equalled the world's record of 4.16 seconds in winning the 440 yard relay race at the Kansas relay here yesterday. The world mark was set by the New York Club in 1925. Lolita Cuzarare, Tarahumara Indian girl, running twenty-nine miles from Topeka, reached Memorial Stadium, at 2.45 o'clock. Her sister, Juanita, dropped out of the run three and a half miles from Lawrence. Lolita, an 18 year old, ninety pound girl, covered the twenty-nine miles between Topeka and Lawrence in six hours, 37 minutes, 45 seconds. She ran twenty-five miles forty one seconds, breaking the world's record for that distance.
