"THE AFFIDAVIT"

The resolution adopted at the C. A. H. A. meeting in regard to affidavits provides that in future every hockey player asking for a transfer, must himself sign a sworn affidavit before a notary public that the transfer is made at the personal request of the player, that no monetary or other consideration has been given or will be received in connection therewith, that no position or situation, salary, or bonus gift, or loan or inducement has been offered, or will be accepted for his services as a player. In the past the player has simply signed a form indicating this, now it has to be a sworn affidavit, carrying with it all the penalties that are provided for any false sworn declaration.

"STAY EAST"

According to the New Glasgow News, Ontario hockey clubs "are turning cold shoulders to those who deserted the O. H. A. last season. The slogan seems to be "Stay East, Young Man, Stay East." Two boys who played in the Eastern League last season are said to have been practically refused permission to play in their old organizations."

Amherst Fans Predict Great Hockey Year

AMHERST, Oct. 23.—The champions of the Northern Section M.A.H.A. will have a more powerful hockey aggregation this winter than the one which startled fandom and left the wise ones talking to themselves by riding rough-shod over the prides of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island teams last spring. Practically all members of the 1931 champions will be available and those who profess to be in the "know" predict Steve Easterbrooks, colorful little left winger, will have his mail coming to him here when the season starts.

From indications the Amherst Ramblers will make a strong bid to retain their title. "Bubbles" MacDonald will be in goal with Louis Farrow as a reserve, Paddy Cormier will again appear on defence, flanked by that hard checker, Douglas Elderkin. Johnson Fraser, son of D. W. Fraser, a former president of the M.P.B.A.A.U. of C., may also appear in a Rambler uniform, and will serve at defence and on the forward line. Fraser, who was with the Amherst team in 1927—teaming up on defence with Harry Bartlett and Ralph Langille, has since played with the Atlantic City Sea Gulls, also the Royal Bank of Canada team in the Montreal Bankers' League.

The amalgamation of Sackville and Mt. Allison is also being suggested.

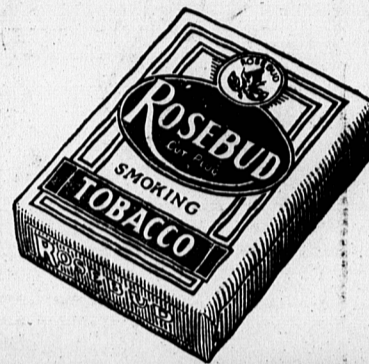
The sectional situation is still in the air but Mr. Wry has promised an early meeting. At that gathering the entire affair will be straightened out.
