GRAIN

WINNIPEG, May 2—In the absence of important operations on either the buying or selling side of the market, wheat prices marked time on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today and closed unchanged to 1/4 cent lower. May wheat ended at 84 1/2, July at 85 1/2, and October at 87 1/2 cents offerings during the session were usual and the fact coupled with the upward tendency of Liverpool offset the effect of small foreign demand.

Quotations had a range of less than half a cent, showing both gains and losses during the morning. Volume of trade through the pit was light but the undertone of the market was quite friendly. Weather reports from North America and the Canadian Basin appear to be creating a little uneasiness in the wheat market, where wheat finished with gains of 1/4 to 3/8 cent. Chicago wheat was comparatively firm. Corn closed steady at 37 1/2 cents. Oats were restricted owing to the scarcity of supplies which are not expected to exceed the 1933 crop. Bacon brought a premium on select. Butchers' heavies and lights were 35 and extra heavies 37.50.

Maple Leaf Tour of Canada From England

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, May 2.—Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner to the United Kingdom, announced tonight a "Maple Leaf Tour of Canada" would be launched Aug. 10 in co-operation with Canadian railways.

Mr. Ferguson made the announcement at a dinner attended by major executives of big British food stores. He said for the first time offer scholarships enabling boys in their fourth year to accompany the tour.

He would not ask, he said, that the tourists should necessarily place orders in Canada, but he added he believed what they learned in the Dominion would create a relationship that would produce orders.

The High Commissioner was congratulated on the plan by Dominion Secretary Mr. J. H. Thomas, who said: "Mr. Ferguson, who always has his eye on the main chance, has completely justified his appointment by this single occasion."

New England lobster fishermen have banded together in an attempt to change tariff laws to curtail import of Nova Scotia lobsters.

The Hog Situation

A review of conditions governing breeding, feeding, and marketing hogs during recent months indicates that in the Western provinces as a whole there may be some decline in output during the early part of the year, followed by a fairly steady increase in movements to yards and packing plants. Price is a tremendous factor in the situation. The strong advancing price position of hogs during the early weeks of the present year, and the growing confidence in the British bacon marketing scheme is no doubt resulting in the finishing of every available pig, the shipping of fewer sows to market, and a high percentage of the total for slaughter coming out to stockyards and packing plants.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTRÉAL, May 2.—The Gazette states: "A situation in the newspaper industry which is attracting considerable attention at the present time is the possibility of a shortage of pulpwood, engendered by a variety of factors. A chief reason, naturally, has been the sharp expansion in the consumption and in turn production of newsprint. To this can be added the fact that most mills in the past years have concentrated on reducing their wood piles, a development dictated by the low level of consumption and price for newsprint, while a third factor was the difficult winter for wood cutting which has just been concluded.

"Varying views are taken in the industry and in other interested sources as to the imminence of such a shortage but for the most part there appears agreement that there has been a distinct tendency in that direction. Even while few believe that the condition will assume anything of an acute character, at least in the immediate future. While some mills have undoubtedly been able to maintain a better position than others, so far as pulpwood supplies are concerned, it can broadly be assumed that the industry as a whole has been engaged in converting assets into cash working capital.

"The increase in consumption and production of newsprint paper in the past few months has been little short of spectacular, and well in excess of general expectation. During the first quarters of this year, production by Canadian mills reached 93 percent of the output for the same period in the peak year, 1929. In the same period, however, revenue amounted to only 83 percent of that achieved in the 1929 period." This was explained the paper added, by reduction in prices and disappearance of premium on United States funds.

NEW YORK EXCHANGE

(By John L. Cooley) (Associated Press Financial Writer) (C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 2—Stocks reacted to the lowest closing average price since mid-January today. With a few exceptions the market was reasonably steady until the last hour when offerings developed larger volume, forcing a general retreat. Net losses ranged from fractions to three points.

United States Government bonds, corn and cotton were the chief gains in other markets. Wheat finished with little change while silver futures had a poor day and rubber met profit-taking. Spot silver jumped 7-8 cents to 42 5/8 cents an ounce, an occurrence that was accompanied by reports of a "mysterious buyer" who recently had been accumulating substantial quantities of the metal.
