

AEROPLANE BANISHING MYSTERY

Now that Lhasa is no longer the forbidden city, Bagdad is no longer isolated by deserts impassable to anything but camels, Timbuctoo is an air-station, and Kumassi has opened a magnificent college, the Westernising of the world seems to be going on at such a pace that romance will soon have to take a back seat or get into communication with Mars in order to open fresh fields.

Of course, the aeroplane has done much to knock the mystery out of things. When one can fly over a forest which was hitherto impenetrable, that fact alone takes all the romance out of the dark and dismal wood.

Similarly with the desert. HOUSEHOLD HELPS

When a water-pitcher has become brown inside from hard water, let milk stay in the pitcher until sour. Then your pitcher will be as clear and bright as when new.

If gum is accidentally besmeared on furniture, rub a little olive oil with a soft cloth on the spot and all traces of gum will disappear. If snot is spilled on the floor, before sweeping it up sprinkle salt on it. The salt keeps the snot together.

Before putting the clothes boiler away after using, dry thoroughly, then rub the inside with a cloth dampened with kerosene. It prevents the boiler from rusting.

When my lace curtains are worn out, I cut them up and stitch three or four layers together. They make lovely dish cloths, and wear as well as those knitted or crocheted out of yarn.

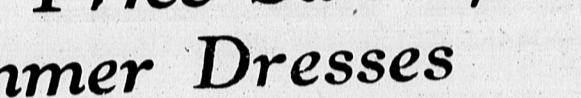
Cold, damp weather sometimes affects the varnish on musical instruments by turning them a grayish color. If the instrument is held over the fire, the original coloring will gradually return. Rub with oil

and its former luster will be resumed. If you run out of starch when washing, use corn starch in the same way and you will have good results.

EASY WAY WITH CURRANTS

The removal of red and black currants from their stalks before cooking is a finger-breaking job of patience and perseverance. It saves a good deal of time, and also saves the hands, if they are pulled through an ordinary table fork. If the main stalk is held in the left hand, and the fork in the right, the currants come away quite easily as they are perked through the prongs.

DRYING HERBS  
Gather the herbs on a dry day close them, cut off all roots, divide them into small bunches, place them on trays or dishes in a cool oven until dry. Hang in brown paper bags in a dry place, or pick the leaves from the stalks, pound them, and rub through a sieve. Store in well-corked bottles. Herbs may be dried in the sun, but more flavor is retained if they are not dried too slowly.
