

FREDERICTON RACES END WITH SPLIT HEATS IN 3 EVENTS

CARD MARKS CLOSING OF MAINE-N. B. CIRCUIT; FRIDAY'S WINNERS

FREDERICTON, Sept. 26.—The Fredericton exhibition's racing program wound up Friday with split heats in all three races and the same thrilling racing that had marked what is conceded by horsemen to have been the most sensational racing of the season and the banner meeting of the down east fall fair.

The racing marked the close of the Maine and New Brunswick circuit for the year and was a fitting end to a season which has been replete with thrills and the fastest average time ever known in down east racing. Three ideal racing days and the fastest kind of foot-fine made possible the most sensational racing ever seen at a fair in the past.

Even the matched race, which Hedgwood K. owned by a Woodstock Syndicate, won from Peterkin, owned by George W. Reed of Fort Fairfield, Maine, went the limit of five heats and all were paced in better than 2:10. Hedgwood K. winning the last three heats after Peterkin had taken the first two rounds and had been beaten only by an eyelash inches in the third heat.

Dempsey Protest On Fight Impends

CHICAGO, Sept. 26.—Should the Illinois Athletic Commission persist in its refusal to reverse the referee's and judges' decision, giving last Thursday night's fight on points to Gene Tunney a formal protest will be filed with the National Boxing Association, Jack Dempsey and his manager, Leo P. Flynn, said today in departing for New York.

"The National Boxing Commission controls boxing in eight States including Illinois. Flynn said a letter formally asking the Illinois Commission to reverse the decision and declare Dempsey the World's Heavyweight Champion had been dispatched to the Illinois body. If the demand is refused, the protest will be taken up with the National Boxing Commission, headquarters of which are at Baltimore.

Davis Cup Hailed

HAVRE, France, Sept. 26.—The historic Davis Cup which France succeeded in wresting from the United States this year, came to the continent for the first time yesterday and was ceremoniously greeted. The cup was carried off the steamship France by four uniformed sailors followed by Henri Cochet and Pierre Gillo, captain of the successful French team, who were greeted by a delegation of tennis officials.

Two fine limousines sent by the father of Rene Lacoste, the French ace, carried the cup and the delegation to Paris, where it was understood, it would be installed at the Louvre Museum until the French lose it. "That won't be soon," Cochet said. "We are going to do all that we can to keep it for at least ten years."

Lt. Batten Takes Air Trophy Race
