**New York Ranger Forward Injured**

LAKE PLACID, N.Y., Sept. 23 (OP) — Manager Frank Boucher of the N.H.L. New York Rangers today announced that forward Eddie Slowinski of Winnipeg will be out of action for a week or more with a bad knee injury.

In another of the injuries which have been plaguing the Rangers, Slowinski crashed into the boards during a lively scrimmage Wednesday.

A new forward combination has caught the eye of Boucher and possibly may be the third line. On it are little Dunc Fisher of Regina and big Nick Mickoski of Winnipeg, who flank Don Raleigh of Kenora, Ont.

Raleigh played with the Blue Shirts last season, totalling 33 points on 15 goals and 18 assists. Fisher and Mickoski started out the 1947-48 season with the Rangers, advanced to the New Haven Ramblers of the American Hockey League and wound up the season with the Rangers. Fisher and Mickoski are both 21 years old. Raleigh is 22.

Only one line is certain thus far — the Edger Laprade, Tony Leswick and Ed Kullman combination, and Boucher is experimenting daily with wings to flank Buddy O'Connor, flashy centre and one of the league's highest scorers.

Elmer Ward came through for Charlottetown in the role of pinch hitter. His single drove in the two runs that tied the ball game. We seem to remember this same Ward making a very important hit in one of the championship games in Summerside last year.

Charlottetown's infield, even in defeat, looked good as usual. They executed two smart double plays, making a total of five in the last two games.

Summerside now leads the series two games to one, and Charlottetown is faced with the formidable task of taking two games in a row. Charlie Hogan's crew do not feel that they are out of the woods yet, however, as anything can happen when these two very evenly matched teams pit their skill against each other. Joe Bernard will probably be in there against Charlottetown on Sunday and the hopes of local fans are high that he will be able to clinch the championship for Summerside. His victories over Charlottetown have been, for the most part, very close affairs, however, and the Capital City boys will no doubt put up a bitter fight to win this home game.

All summer we were under the impression that Charlottetown had more power in their attack than our boys. Strangely enough it is not turning out that way. Summerside seems to have the edge on power, and it is Charlottetown's superior defensive work that is making the games so close thus far.

Congratulations to the Recco Juniors on their winning the Island Junior Championship. Now that they have triumphed over our locals, all Prince County baseball fans will be behind them in their fight for a Maritime title.

Joe Bernard has done it again! Summerside's "Miracle Man of the Mound," answered the S.O.S. call when Daley faltered in the eighth inning after pitching a whole of a game for seven frames. Bernard was touched for a single which brought in two runs in the eighth, but struck out the next four men. In the first of the ninth he was behind MacKenzie, three balls and no strikes, a tight spot that would daunt many a pitcher, but not Joe Bernard. Summerside's flinging ace rallied, and struck the classy Charlottetown second sacker out. The last man he had to face was the redoubtable Whitlock, but this didn't faze Joe either. The harder they are, the bigger the smack in the catcher's glove.

While we hail Bernard as the special nemesis of the Capital City sappers, the contribution that Poney Daley made towards our second victory must not be overlooked. Daley allowed only two hits up to the end of the fifth inning, and no earned runs were chalked up against his delivery all afternoon. He got into difficulties in the eighth, chiefly because of two errors. He might have worked his way out of the hole he was in if he had continued pitching, but there was too much at stake, and Charlie Hogan couldn't afford to take any chances, so he played the ace. That ace was trumps, brother, don't make any mistake about that.

And that little fellow by the name of Hank! Were we right when we called him "Mr. Short-stop"? Only for that old Whammy thing, we'd give him a brand new sobriquet. You guessed it, "The Sultan of Swat!" Landry's homer with Mickos on first was a pipkin and came just when the players and fans were a bit dejected because Charlottetown had gone into the lead in their half by scoring a run that shouldn't have happened. His grand slam was the turning point of the contest. It put the boys in the driver's seat, and although they were tied briefly after this they were never again headed.

Clutch hitter Frankie Outway pinch hit for Gallant in the fourth, but was not given an opportunity to extend his record of coming through in the pinches. Ryan clipped him with an inside pitch and he reached first. His being there proved important, because if the bases had not been filled, the free ticket to Daley would not have forced in a run, and as
