Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Heartz of Amherst were receiving the congratulations of their friends on Saturday last, it being the 38th anniversary of their marriage.

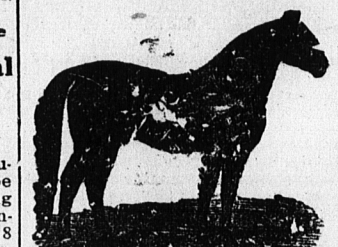
Mrs. W. A. Brennan of Summerside is among the welcome visitors here this week.

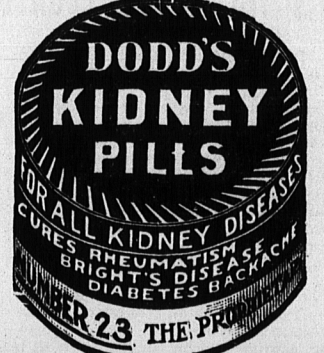
