Buyers are paying eighteen to twenty-two cents per bushel for potatoes and ten to twelve cents for turnips.

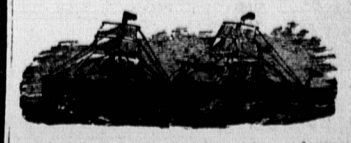
