**Finland Women Well Prepared For Emergency**

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Of all the women in the world, Finland's are perhaps the best prepared for a national emergency.

And this valuable asset in the little country's present crisis is credited to a lone woman—Finland's heroine of the first great war.

Her name is Lotta Svärd. When her husband went to war, she went with him cooking his food, mending his clothes and nursing his wounds. When he was killed, she continued to work for other soldiers.

Her deeds snowballed into a national inspiration for the women of Finland, and today 100,000 of them—one out of every 20 women in the country—are voluntary members of the Lotta Svärd Organization, trained intensively for vital duties in a national emergency.

Ilta Helsingius, an attractive 27-year-old member of the group, who is preparing to return to Finland after a summer at the New York World's Fair Finnish Pavilion, told about it today.

The women carry on the "Lotta" work in addition to their normal civilian life contributing one or two days a week. They range in age from 17 up, and there is a junior division for girls down to 11.

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**Daily War Survey**

One of the significant developments on the diplomatic front in the past week was the exchange of letters of friendship between Italy and Greece. Relations between these two states have been far from friendly over a period of years and Italy's seizure of Greece as a threat. It brought Italian forces across the Adriatic Sea and right up to the western Greek frontier.

Greece is one of the Balkan states which enjoys a guarantee from Great Britain and France and allied with Turkey which in turn has a treaty of mutual assistance with the western powers. Thus the arrangement between Italy and Greece, apart from soothing over old disputes brings Germany a new silent axis partner a step closer to the western democracies.

The occupation of Albania gave Italy a foothold on the eastern shore of the Adriatic. At that time it was regarded as worst as an act of reckless aggression and at best as a coldblooded move to protect Italian investments in Albania.

Now however the possession of Albania makes it much simpler for Premier Mussolini to work out his apparent plan of establishing a peace bloc in the Balkans under Italian leadership and to combat Russian and German influence in that quarter.

It may or may not be due to Italy's power and efforts that the Balkan nations, once described as the "powder keg of Europe," remain at peace while the war rages to the north of them and threatens even the normally secure Scandinavian states. How long they continue at peace is problematical having regard to Russian aspirations for the acquisition of the Roumanian province of Bessarabia.
