LANE GIVES LAST WORD TO MEXICO

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., November 21.—The American commissioners today gave to the Mexican commissioners what is understood to be the last opportunity for an amicable settlement of the problems that have arisen because of Carranza's failure to provide adequate protection for life and property along the international border.

These meetings are held in a brick tabernacle, built expressly for the purpose on grounds on Huntington avenue, formerly the scene of the national baseball contests.

The "biggest ever" was the goal the committee in its memoranda set out to reach. They would not be content to merely surpass the accomplishments of all previous Billy Sunday committees. What they wanted, and what they set out to do, was to place the credit of Boston that the biggest and most up-to-date revival of modern times will be held by its people, and all signs point to a fulfillment of their ambition in this respect.

A choir of 8,000 voices leads in the singing, which is a powerful factor in the evangelistic work. Of course the choir does not always appear in full strength, as it will not permit, but on very special occasions or in the event of overflow meetings, the full choir will be utilized.

In discussing the meetings with a prominent clergyman, a former professor in an American university, an objection was raised, one which holds considerable weight amongst the people in Canada, that there was too great an evidence of luxuriousness and worldly wisdom in connection with not merely these particular Billy Sunday meetings, but throughout all his meetings since his advent as an evangelist.

For the collections of the running expenses, a matter not to be overlooked, some eight dozen gallon milk cans have been secured, and these will be passed amongst the congregations in place of the usual collection plates.

In reply to which the clergyman said: "You must bear in mind that the people of Canada view matters in a different light than the people of this country. In Canada, I can quite understand, the people not attaching the same measure of importance to wealth as is attached by the people of the United States, would be considered wealth as a disadvantage rather than as an advantage to a man engaged in religious work, whereas in this country it is just the opposite. 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THANKSGIVING DAY IN UNITED STATES NOV. 30

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—President Wilson has by proclamation designated Thursday, Nov. 30, as Thanksgiving Day. The President's proclamation follows:

"It has long been the custom of our people to turn in the fruitful autumn of the year in praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God for his mercies, blessings and mercies to us and the nation."

"The year that has elapsed since we last observed our day of thanksgiving has been rich in blessings to us, as a people, but the whole face of the world has been darkened by war. In the midst of our peace and happiness our thoughts dwell with painful disquiet upon the struggles and sufferings of the nations at war and of the peoples upon whom war has brought disaster, without choice or possibility of escape on their part. We cannot think of our happiness without thinking of their pitiful distress."

"Now, therefore, I Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do appoint Thursday, the 30th of November, as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, and urge and advise the people to resort to their several places of worship on that day to render thanks to Almighty God for the blessings of peace and unbroken prosperity which He has bestowed upon our beloved country in such unanticipated measure."

"And I also urge and suggest our duty in this, our day of peace and abundance, to think in deep sympathy of the stricken peoples of the world upon whom the curse and terror of war has so pitilessly fallen and to contribute our abundant means to the relief of their suffering."

"Our people could in no better way show their real attitude toward the present struggle of the nations than by contributing out of their abundance to the relief of the suffering which war has brought in its train."

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed."

"Done at the city of Washington, this 17th day of November, in the year of our Lord, 1916, and of the Independence of the United States the 141st. (Signed) 'WOODROW WILSON, By the President, Robert Lansing, Secretary of State.'"
