LONDON, Oct. 23.—The Parliamentary correspondent of the Sunday Times says that, although the importance of the German Naval successes in the Gulf of Riga, have been greatly exaggerated, the Russian positions grow steadily worse, and that there is a growing fear that there is "need of revision of our financial and other commitments to our eastern ally."

LT. H. LARGE, R.F.C. LEAVES TOMORROW

For Toronto Where He Has Been Appointed Instructor at the Aviation School There

Lieut. Heber R. Large, R.F.C., veteran of Givimchy, Festaubert, Ypres, La Bassée and many of the earlier Canadian engagements—one of the "first six" to leave the Island for overseas duty—has been appointed by the appointment to a post at the aviation schools in Toronto and leaves for that city tomorrow morning.

He is the third Island officer to receive a similar honor and will have as fellow instructors at the schools Major Sherren, R.F.C., from Capaud and Lieut. Ronald Stewart, R.F.C., City, his companion for three years at the front and also one of the "six signallers" who have done more than their duty in the present war.

Lieut. Large is not only a skilled aviator but a full-fledged pilot, wearing the coveted double wings, and has seen service in map making, reconnoitering, aerial photography, aerial gunnery, and coast defence, fighting against the Zeppelin raiders. It was during one of these engagements that Lieut. Large received his injuries which resulting in him being invalided home. His machine, with several others, attacked a fleet of Zeppelins which were attempting a raid on London, July 5th and during the fighting Lieut. Large's machine was struck in the petrol tank, which burst into flames. At a height of 700 feet Lieut. Large lost consciousness a bullet having wounded him in the thigh some minutes before—and the machine with its pilot and gunner fell to the earth.

Lieut. Large was badly burned in the face and arms, besides the wound in his leg and was for over two months in hospital before getting his short home leave. His many friends are delighted to know that the genial and popular "flier" will remain in Canada. And needless to say, this appointment takes a heavy load of care and
