FLY EGGS, MILK TO N.F.L.D.—An American Army transport plane landed at the local airport yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Stephenville, Newfoundland. After taking on a quantity of eggs, milk and other fresh food, the plane left an hour later.

BUS CATCHES FIRE.—The City firemen were called to the North River Road about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon when a I.M.T. bus had caught fire. However, the flames had been extinguished by volunteer firemen before the firemen arrived. Only slight damage resulted. AWAIT START OF SERVICE.—Two companies, one an American and the other a Canadian, mainly composed of Prince Edward Islanders, are waiting for favorable conditions to make plane flights from Charlottetown to New Brunswick tomorrow. Officials of both companies said last night they expect to start their flights tomorrow. It is understood the current price for fuel is 20 cents a pound for "cannons" and from 25 to 27 cents for market lobsters. The latter are of a larger size.

The police believe the young lad responsible for the thefts is a 14-year-old boy named Donald's store, Crockett's furniture store, and Woolworth's store. Whether or not all four youngsters are accused of breaking into each of those business places, could not be given to the press. Unofficial sources were of the opinion that one or two of the lads may have been recently joined by a gang. Police said the juveniles admitted having broken into the Rosebank cottages owned by Dr. Leo Frank.

Fruit Growers Hold Informal Meeting

Apart from formal annual conferences, informal talks by entomologists to fruit growers in the interior fruit growing districts in British Columbia have proved so popular and effective that the educational series of view that they may become permanent institutions. U. S. PUBLIC WANTS DRAFT CONTINUED FOR ONE YEAR

Majority in Poll Fear Volunteering Will Not Be Large Enough To Justify Draft Halt

By American Institute of Public Opinion

PRINCETON, N. J., May 12 — Three important facts about the public's attitude toward the draft are revealed in the latest nation-wide survey by the Institute. 1. The public is in favor of continuing the draft for another year. Twice as many persons questioned in the poll approve such a step as oppose it.

2. The majority do not believe that enough volunteers will join the army to make it possible to postpone drafting from May to October, as proposed in the House version of the draft extension bill.

3. The draft act should be amended, in the opinion of the minority of voters, to prohibit drafting of men below the age of 20.

The present sentiment on draft extension is shown below, and a comparison with a similar poll conducted in March.

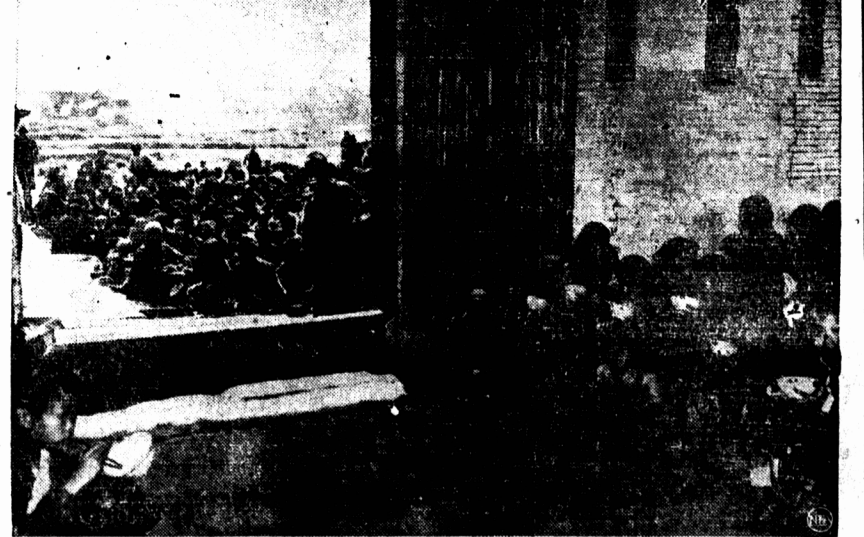
