The latest news, first of all.

—S. M. Hicks, Summerside, has been appointed I. C. R. Ticket Agent in the place of W. T. Burrows deceased.

—The valuable farm property of William Tanton, situated at Sberbrook, sold at auction yesterday and was bid in by Thomas Bishop of Wellington for \$3580.

—B. W. Tanton, Summerside, has purchased from Alex. Campbell, the excellent building lot at the corner of convent and Summer streets, Summerside, as a site for a new residence.

—At the Police Court in Summerside yesterday Clement Arsenault, on whose place a raid was made about a month ago, was convicted of a second offence against the prohibition act and fined \$200 and costs.

—The following are the Alberton market prices:—White oats, per bushel, 41 to 42 cents; black oats, per bushel, 42 cents; butter, per pound, 16 cents; eggs, per dozen, 16 cents; pork, per pound, 10 to 10 1/2 cents; hides, per pound, 8 1/2 cents; loose hair, per ton, \$9, and pressed, per ton, \$9 to \$10.

—With the arrival of the Empress navigation was formally opened at Summerside yesterday, the earliest with one exception for a number of years. The Minto which left Charlottetown about 8 o'clock arrived off the mouth of the harbor about 11 a.m. and, after cutting part way through the ice there, turned around and steamed back to Charlottetown.

—The Empress which left Charlottetown at 10.15 arrived at the mouth of the harbor about 1 o'clock and had considerable trouble in breaking her way into the harbor, finally docking about 2.15 p.m. The officers of the Empress claim that the Minto cut very little into the heavy ice at the mouth of the harbor, only cutting through outside ice which the Empress went through in a different course from that of the Minto with very little trouble. Capt. Cameron reports some ice in the Straits especially around Crapaud but experienced no trouble with it on the way up. The Empress will leave at the usual hour 10 o'clock this a.m. for Pt. du Chene and, ice permitting, will endeavor to make the round trip.

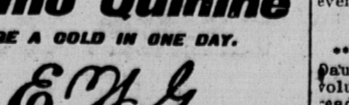

TO SABBATH DESECRATION.

Sir:—Evidently unnecessary work is done occasionally by some mail carrier on the Lord's Day. Recently on Sabbath I beheld in a house in my congregation a mail bag awaiting the call of doing his work when not paid for doing it. Is it true that in the island, with all its boasted civilization, educational system, professed devotion to legal arrangement made for our general good and perhaps a greater proportion of churches and religious teachers and other expressions of being a God-fearing people than can be found amid a similar number in Canada, that we permit deliberate perversion of God's Holy Day? Is it true that mail bags which should be in the city on Saturday occasionally even when the weather on preceding day was favorable are deposited in post office on Sabbath night? Is it true that some mailmen in order to perform work at home save expense in city or gain in some other way, actually defer conveying mail to destination on Saturday night, but illegally, boldly, call for His Majesty's mail at every office in their route on evening of Lord's Day? Is it true that even some prominent members of the Presbyterian Church have accommodated him, instead of refusing the bags (due on preceding night) till Monday morning? Is it true that some folk think that it is more legal, necessary, than lots of other work they would immediately be fined for doing on God's Day? What would the carrier, loading up the mail, say if he saw the butcher gathering up the lambs purchased on Saturday, or the milkman going his rounds' work, or claim, just as legitimate as is reported some contractors do on the Sabbath Day? Sedition even in the stormiest season is it absolutely necessary to do this work on Sabbath, for how do we get along when for days between Sabbath occasionally we have no mail? Imagine other toilers who find their plans broken up for a while by storms, making up for lost time by working as on other days or driving their loads of produce into our fair capital, while many there are assembling in their Bethels, sometimes to read, chant or speak scriptural statements, re the origin, need, profit and general beauty of God's Day? Do some mail-carriers resort to this arrive at the post office with a load which could have been deposited on Saturday night, or if impossible I contend then not till Monday? In God's name I boldly ask for authority for such prostitution of God's Day, if it be true that it is thus used.

I beheld a post-mistress in this County with a company of friends or neighbors in office on Sabbath night doing up the mail. Later I kindly inquired re matter and was informed that the mail-man came very early on Monday here, she, to save too early rising, had it ready for him. When I asked why it was not done Saturday night, she amazed me by stating that some business men and others brought mail to office on Sabbath, and wished her to defer her Saturday night work to accommodate them.

SIX PEOPLE ARE SERIOUSLY BURNED IN C. N. R. WREOCK

REGINA, Sask., April 4.—The Saskatchewan express, which left Regina Saturday evening on the Canadian Northern was wrecked about twenty-two miles east of the city, the engine and tender being derailed.

The conductor secured means to return to Regina for another engine, as there is no telegraph office at Jamieson, where the wreck occurred. After he left the scene an explosion took place in the baggage car and the cars caught fire, five coaches being destroyed. The fire spread with fearful rapidity and though the trainmen and passengers fought with all the means at their command it was of no avail. Wet blankets were hung between cars to check the flames without effect. It was early Sunday morning before the fire burned itself out.

Six passengers were badly burned about the hands and faces and hardly one on the train escaped some injury. Oil cans in the baggage car caused the explosion. The injured were brought to Grey Nurse Hospital, Regina, this morning for treatment. They are: Garfield Mackay, baggage-man, Winnipeg; Antoine Moscow, section man, Jamieson; Aylmer Travis, farmer, Sinitaula; Grant Holtz, Chicago; J. O. Olsen, Zealandia, passenger; and F. J. Hutchinson, brakeman, Winnipeg. The last two are very seriously burned but there are good hopes of their recovery.

What a hell upon earth would prevail if all deserted the Sabbath like some persist in doing. Eventually there would obtain and reign a state of things akin to that of the land of the Sabbath bull-fight. There are many lovers of God's Day in this fair land. Let us look alive for its future and better observance.
