Cunningham Sets New Record
NEW YORK, March 17.—Glenn Cunningham, king of the milers, stepped out of his division Saturday night to create a new world's indoor record for 1,000 yards and then came back to win his own event in the Knights of Columbus track and field meet at Madison Square Garden.
In the 1,000-yard event Cunningham reeled off the distance in 2:01.1 to beat Chuck Hornbostel, former Indiana University middle distance ace, by three yards and slice nearly two seconds off his 13-year-old record of 2:12 set by Harold Outbill.
One hour later the burly Kansas came back and beat off the challenge of Gene Venzke of Pennsylvania in a gruelling last lap duel to win the classic Columbian mile by the same margin. Cunningham's time of 4:14.3 was far back of his world's indoor mark of 4:08.4 set in winning the same event last year.
Hornbostel came back after losing to Cunningham to win the 600-yard event by three yards from Ivan Fuqua of Indiana University, in 1:12.7.
Ralph Metcalf, the dark flash from Marquette, won the 60-yard sprint in 6.4 seconds, beating Ralph Peacock and Jesse Owens in that order.

CINCINNATI REDS TO MAKE STRONG BID

"New Deal" Expected to Lift Cincinnati Club From Cellar Position.
(This is the seventh of a series analyzing major league baseball prospects.)

TAMPA, Fla., March 17.—Cincinnati, one of baseball's most ancient and conservative strongholds, will be proving ground this year for as drastic a series of experiments as the major leagues have ever witnessed.
On the general theory that there is nothing to lose and everything to gain, the Reds will tackle the toughest opposition in baseball with a club rebuilt from rookie talent. Two thirds of the starting lineup, including the entire infield, will consist of big league freshmen.

The Reds have been a National League doormat for six years, cellar champions for the last four seasons. Under a new and highly enterprising ownership, headed by Powell Crosley, Jr., Larry MacPhail as general manager and Charlie Dressen as field leader, there's a complete and unprecedented "new deal."
The scattered nucleus of major experience consists mainly of two former Yankees, Pitcher Danny MacFadyen and center-fielder Sammy Byrd, besides three survivors of the big shakeup, left-fielder Chick Hafey, pitchers Paul Derringer and Silas Johnson.
Hafey, who dropped below the 300 mark last season for the first time in eight years, is confident of a comeback. It's only other long range hitter of major league experience is Ernie Lombardi, the big backstop, who will split the catching with a newcomer, Bill Campbell, purchased from Los Angeles.

The new infield consists of Johnny Mize, Alex Kaempfer, Billy Myers and Lew Riggs, reading from right to left. Myers, a great looking shortstop, is the key man. Mize bought from Rochester (N.Y.) on condition because of leg trouble, appears sound of limb and sturdy at bat.
Ival Goodman, another Rochester product, is slated to join Byrd and Hafey in the outfield. Goodman hit .331 in the International League last year. Harlin Pool and Adam Comorosky will be in reserve.
Tony Freitas, a southpaw and Benny Frey, veteran right-hander, will share the main pitching assignments with Derringer, Johnson and MacFadyen. Don Brennan, former Yankee "farm hand" and Gene Schott, a right-hander, both up from Toronto, appear the best of the newcomers.
