DETROIT MAKES PLAN FOR LEGION CONVENTION

DETROIT, April 10—(U.P.)—When members of the American Legion start for Detroit next September to attend the national legion convention the biggest migration in the history of the nation will be underway.

O'Neill said 100,000 legionnaires and 50,000 members of auxiliary organizations will visit Detroit for the convention Sept. 21.

CITY TO SAVE OLD HOSPITAL
