NOTED AVIATOR INVITED TO VISIT PROVINCE

ISLAND GOVT. FORWARDS WARM INVITATION TO LINDBERGH WHO IS SCHEDULED TO ARRIVE AT HALIFAX.

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, July 7—(A.P.)—General Italo Balbo announced today he plans to order a take off at dawn Saturday of the squadron of 24 seaplanes he is leading on a flight to the Century of Progress Exposition in Chicago by way of Eastern Canada.

The armada arrived here late Wednesday and has since been awaiting favorable weather for the fourth stage of the trip, a 1,500 mile hop to Cartwright, Labrador.

The General's announcement was made aboard the liner Kungsholm in the harbor here. He and his companions were luncheon guests aboard the vessel.

Mechanics have completed a check-over of the seaplanes and pronounced them ready for what is considered the most difficult stage of the entire trip.

Blaze Causes Extensive Damage

RIMOUSKI, Que., July 7.—Damage estimated at \$250,000 was caused by a stubborn fire which broke out early today at Caussapascal, Metapedia County. The blaze was brought under control and the entire village was saved from destruction only after a long fight.

The offices of the International Paper Company, one house, a blacksmith shop, several stores, an aeroplane hanger, a garage and a house were destroyed and five other properties were damaged.

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MOSCOW, July 7—(A.P.)—Jimmie Mattern, Texas aviator missing since June 14 when he took off on another leg of his attempted solo flight around the world, is safe in isolated and sparsely-settled north-eastern Siberia.

A telegram received today direct from the flyer by the Moscow correspondent of the New York Times said simply:

"Safe at Anadir, Chukotka, Siberia. Jimmie Mattern."
The message was dated at the town of Bocharova. The sending time was 11 p. m. July 5.

TWELVE ARE MISSING IN FLOOD AREA

Flood Sweeping Bear Creek Canyon, Near Denver, Demolishes Town.

DENVER, July 7.—(A.P.)—One body was recovered tonight and Jefferson County authorities said at least 12 persons were missing in a flood which swept Bear Creek Canyon a few miles west of Denver, demolishing one resort town and damaging another.

The body, that of a woman, was found near Morrison. It was not identified immediately.

All bridges and summer cabins near the creek for four miles between Idledale and Morrison were swept away, said Ralph Keeler, correspondent for the Associated Press who was the first person through the area after the storm.

Keeler walked from Idledale, which was virtually swept away by the storm, to Morrison. He said he saw no human bodies, but that many houses and cows had perished.

Among the missing were Mrs. Silvia Soderman of Denver, W. L. Burton of Idledale, owner of a Ham-

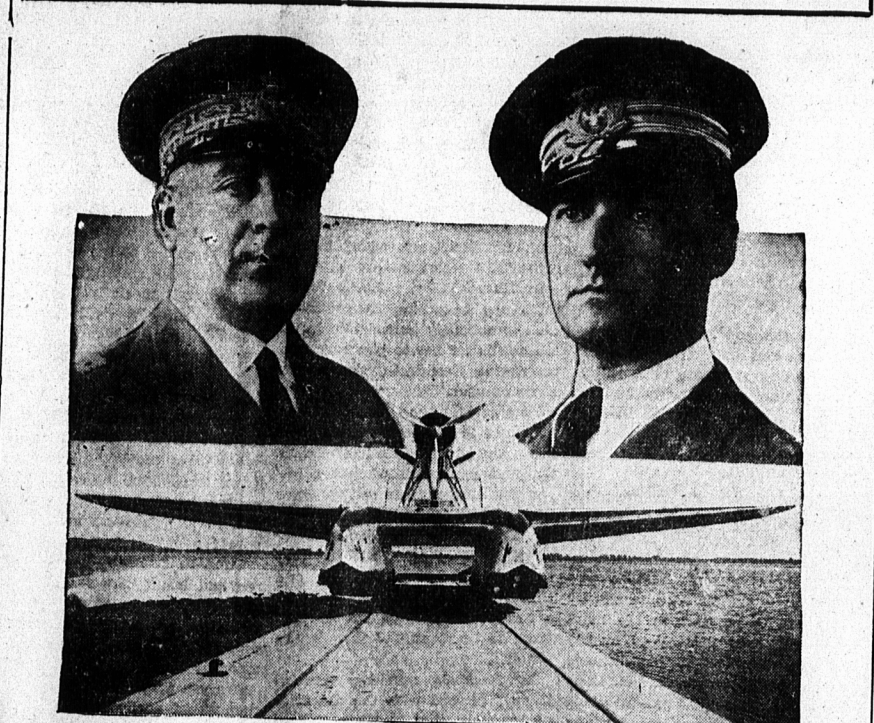
Sentenced For "Cutlass Crime"

She finally succeeded in climbing to the window, and saw her mother on the floor with Maharaj kneeling beside her, cutlass in hand.

Every Phase Of Economic Agenda To Be Discussed

CHAMBERLAIN IS SUPPORTED BENNETT IS ACCLAIMED

British Chancellor's Motion to Retain Complete Agenda Is Sustained. Canadian Premier Is Credited With Gaining Support of Great Britain.

LONDON, July 7.—Rallying behind Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Canada, the other British Dominions, India, the United States, Japan, China, the Scandinavian countries and most of Latin America today voted to continue discussions of every phase of the World Economic agenda.

By the vote of 25 to 15, the British Chancellor's motion to retain the complete agenda was carried against the unremitting opposition of France and her allies. The gold bloc however scored a victory in another committee decision when by a vote of eight to seven it was decided that discussion of tariffs and quotas would not be continued.

Roosevelt Drafts Plan To Raise World Prices

WASHINGTON, July 7.—A message outlining in detail the plan of his Government for an endeavor to raise world prices as an immediate objective for the London Economic Conference was drafted tonight by President Roosevelt for dispatch to the American delegation.

Gratified by the decision to continue the parity, Mr. Roosevelt hastened to put his views before the delegation to guide it in its endeavors regarding his price boosting programme.

He prepared his message outlining his views and clarifying the administration's position after two lengthy conferences with his immediate advisers.

Will Broadcast Arrival Of Air Armada At Mt'l.

OTTAWA, July 7.—The arrival of the Italian Air Armada at Montreal will be covered in a descriptive broadcast arranged by the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Company and Canada and the United States, it was announced today. Plans have been made to place a broadcasting crew at the seaplane basin at Longueuil, a suburb of Montreal, where General Balbo is expected to bring his aerial fleet, enroute to Chicago, within the next week. The Italian party was at Reykjavik, Iceland, today.

Tale Of Tragedy From The Hurricane Area

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, July 7.—Stories of adventure and tragedy growing out of last week's hurricane in southern Trinidad are still reaching the capital.

Captain Lazarus Eno of the sloop Influence, which founded at Point Fortin reached Port of Spain today, to tell of how two of his crew were lost.

The Influence, with cargo for Moruga, was nearing Brighton when the storm blew up. The gale carried away her sails and Captain Eno decided to anchor under Point Fortin. But the gale smashed the sloop against a pier and she went down at once, throwing the crew overboard. The captain and two sailors were able to cling to the rigging until rescued several hours later, but two seamen were drowned.
