Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THIS is the head of a family a 400 man, 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon any quarter section of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, on homestead conditions. A habitable house is required in apt where residence is performed in case of vacancy.

In certain districts a homesteader in good stand may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$500 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also to acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$500 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

### Important Bill Discussed In Parliament

OTTAWA, April 23.—One of the first really important bills of the session occupied the attention of the House this afternoon, first on the second reading and later in the committee stage. It was a measure introduced by Dr. Reid designed to create a company to administer the Canadian National Railways carrying on work which has been done for some time by a directorate appointed as in the case of the Canadian Northern.

This bill aims to put all Government roads under such administering company. One effect would be to bring the Intercolonial Railway and the P. E. Island Railway under control of the Railway Commission as company owned roads are at present.

The Opposition, which allowed the first reading of the bill to pass without comment, put up quite a fight this afternoon, the claim being made by MacKenzie, Bureau and others that the measure was merely designed to create more patronage for the Government that was already reeking with it, despite the pledges of the Union Government that under its rule patronage would be abolished.

Dr. Reid replying instanced the fact that when a bill authorizing the taking over the Canadian Northern was before the House no suggestion was made that it would go to the Railway Committee, yet that measure was absolutely as important as this. He knew certain clauses in the bill to which objection had been taken and when the time came he had amendments proposed to these but he did not agree to the contention that parliament was not qualified to deal with it without reference to the Railway Committee.

Hon. Mr. Bureau following took objection to the plan of public ownership. It had not been successful in my country where it was not entirely divorced from the Government.

Ernest Lapointe of Kamouraska suggested that in order to free itself from the suspicion of a desire to create patronage, the Government might let members of the Opposition name some of the directors. If there were five on the board it would be fair division if members of the Opposition appointed two while the Government named the majority.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, without effort, shattered the specious pretensions of the Opposition. He showed that the directorate of the Canadian Pacific, the most successful railway in operation in Canada today, was composed of business men but in addition practical railway men, employees of the company also were on the board. The same plan would be followed out in the creation of the company which the bill proposed. The Opposition professed to be much shocked at the thought of patronage in connection with the new venture.

Mr. Lapointe had made a brazen proposal by which some of this patronage, if patronage it could be called should be handed over to the Opposition who certainly would use it for political purposes. What the Opposition roundly commended in the Government they were quite willing to spare themselves, if given the opportunity.

Mr. Meighen's able reply practically took the wind out of the Opposition critics and the motion that the House to go into committee to consider the bill passed without division.

The Committee made good progress until the House took recess at six o'clock.

The House to sit Wednesday evenings in future, consequently members today were robbed of the customary Wednesday evening holiday. Members who have been in the West sounding their constituents are commencing to drift back. They bring mixed reports with them. There is no question of much discontent in the western country over the alleged delay in dealing with returned soldiers, also with the complaint of slackness in permitting Hutterites into Canada as a community. It is understood there are now 4000 of these in the country.

The G. W. V. A. West is up in arms in opposition to their being admitted entirely and asking the Government to act at once.

Interest this afternoon was largely in the caucus to be held almost at once. The Unionist party will hold a caucus in the morning at which western members are expected to deliver reports on their visits home and the feeling of the western people on the tariff. The caucus will be largely a meeting called for receipt of this information but there will not likely be much tariff discussion. The Government's policy of investigation through country and the general tariff revision next session, following that investigation is finding amazing support. The general feeling is that this is the safe sane method of procedure. More serious than the situation arising from the dissatisfaction of returned soldiers re Hutterite admissions, etc. It is likely these things will be discussed at some length tomorrow as the Opposition party caucus. Opposition scouts have also been abroad in the land during the Easter vacation. Their reports to the party it is expected that the caucus will also be signalized by the return to the Opposition fold of F. F. Pardee who, rumor says is slated for his old position of chief opposition whip. Naturally there is speculation as to whether any more will follow Pardee from the Union ranks. Probably some would like to but with Laurier dead, and a second rate like MacKenzie in the saddle they will hesitate to take the plunge. The situation is full of interest and if the session up to the Easter adjournment was dead, there is every indication the remainder of the term will be exceedingly lively.

### MONTREAL CARTERS OUT ON STRIKE.

MONTREAL, April 22.—Around five thousand carters are out on strike here and with the refusal of the masters to consider arbitration, settlement of the strike is not in sight.

Tonight delegates from the trade and Labor council conferred with the city administrative council, and suggested arbitration. The carters were at first adverse to this suggestion, but were won over. The masters, how-

ever, refused to consider it, nor will they recognize the union, on the ground that the union has already refused substantial offers of increased pay, including one of \$50 a week plus over time during the busy season to piano movers.

"There is fear that the freight handlers, railway clerks and station employees may join the carters in a sympathetic strike.

Meanwhile the whole business life of Montreal is being badly tied up.

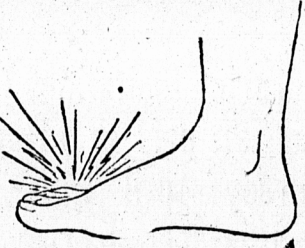

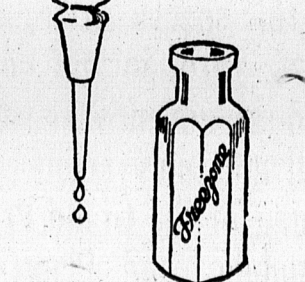
